Flourescent Lighting At Schools Of Dist. 107

The need for improved lighting in classrooms has long been recognized by members of the Board of Education of District 107. As early as the fall of 1944 Lighting Engineers were called in to study lighting conditions in the Elm Place and Green Bay Road Schools and to make recommendations. At that time the priority of War Industries for lighting fixtures and the urgency of other deferred maintenance projects in the schools made it appear unwise to undertake immediately the very costly project of installing fluorescent lights in all classrooms.

A Policy of Experimentation
 A policy of experimentation and careful planning was adopted. As a means of determining an adequate system of lighting which would provide light of the quantity and quality desired, the Science Room at Elm Place was set up as a lighting laboratory. Walls were redecorated in colors possessing proper light reflection factors so that balanced lighting and a pleasing atmosphere resulted. Table tops were refinished in light flat tones to decrease light absorption and eliminate glare points and resulting eye strain. Three rows of fluorescent lights were installed of the semi-indirect luminaire type.

Light Values from 50 to 85 Foot Candles
 The resultant lighting proved both adequate, evenly diffused, and pleasing. A series of spot checks with a light meter indicated light values of from 50 to 85 foot candles at desk top levels. Inasmuch as 20 to 50 foot candles is considered by lighting engineers as adequate for moderately critical and prolonged tasks such as reading, bench work, and classwork, the installation was considered a success.

The Project to Go On
 As money becomes available additional classrooms will be equipped with fluorescent lights. The project has proved to be a needed and worthy one. Eye comfort adds to personal comfort, lessens fatigue, and saves eyes!

Dr. Slight To Present "Barriers To Maturity" At Lincoln School

"Barriers to Maturity" is the subject of the third and final lecture in the current popular series

at the Lincoln School Auditorium, Thursday, November 13, at eight o'clock.

Dr. David Slight, the psychiatrist conducting the series, contends that a mature personality is the only basis for successful achievement in the home, the school, industry and in every relationship in life. While delinquency, alcoholism, divorce and other social problems are symptoms of immaturity, relatively few people are really mature, and as a result there is a great deal of conflict in our society as well as unhappiness regarding human relationships.

The success of our democratic way of life depends upon the development of mature personalities in our children, according to Dr. Slight. The future of democracy in our country will have to be fostered and nurtured. The problems with which we shall be confronted will require a high degree of maturity in everyone if they are to be solved amicably and democratically.

The meaning of maturity will be discussed by Dr. Slight on November 13th as well as how to cope with those things which tend to stifle the development of maturity.

The two previous lectures have attracted a large and interested audience, and have resulted in widespread community discussion, according to Mrs. Charles G. Mason, General Chairman of the sponsoring committee.

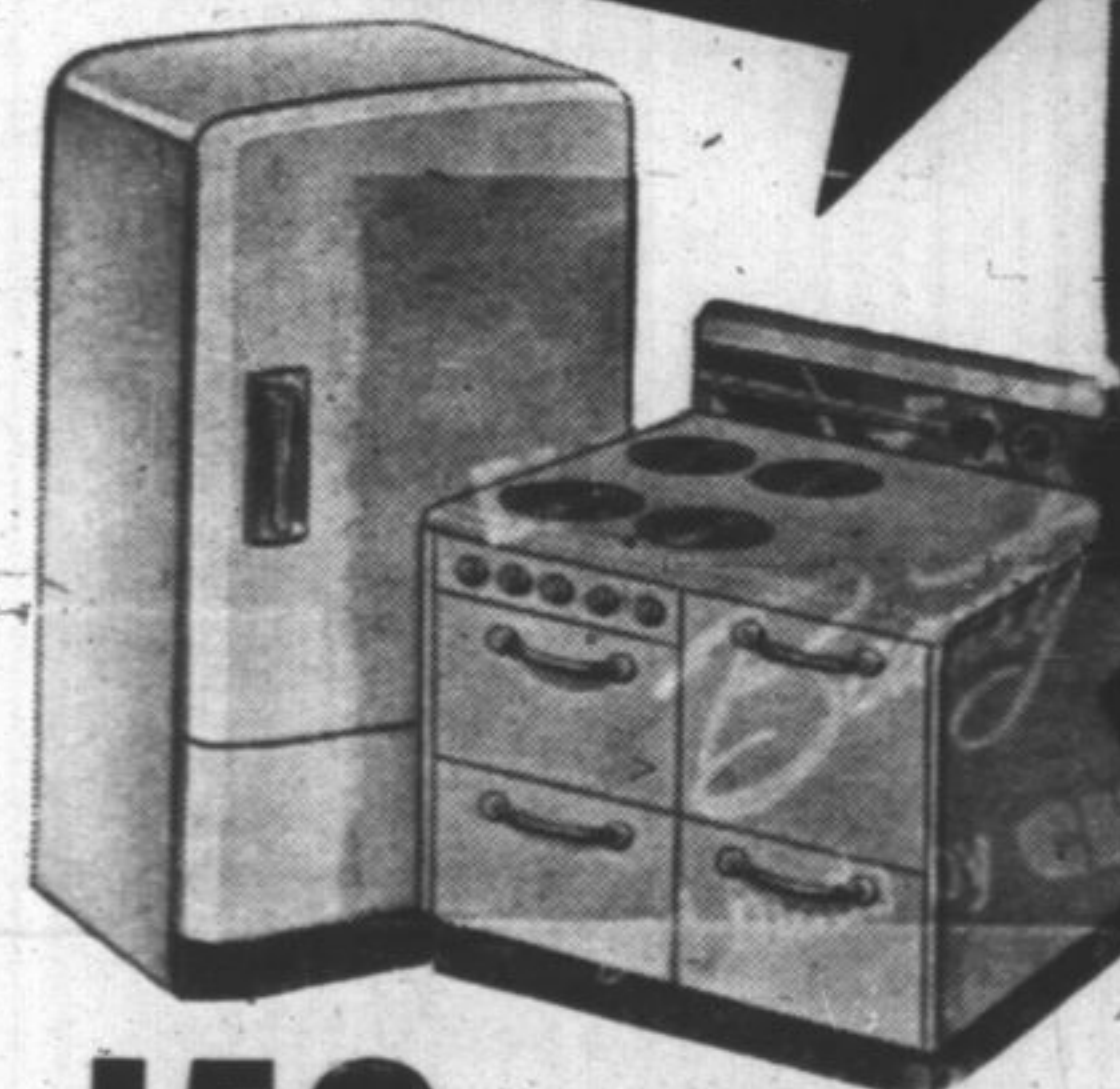
