Lincoln Patrol To Speak At National Conference

The boys and girls patrols of the Lincoln School will present a discussion and demonstration of safety patrol and school patrol programs at the National Conference of the American Education Fellowship in Chicago at the Stevens Hotel on Friday, November 28. Mack Elected To UWF Nat'l. Student Council
Robert T. Mack, Jr., of 296 Hazel Avenue, Highland Park, as a result of the leading role he played in St. Louis last month in formulating the new and much broadened policy of United World Federalists, has been elected to the National Student Council by the votes of delegates from over 160 student chapters attending the annual General Assembly meeting on November 1 and 2.

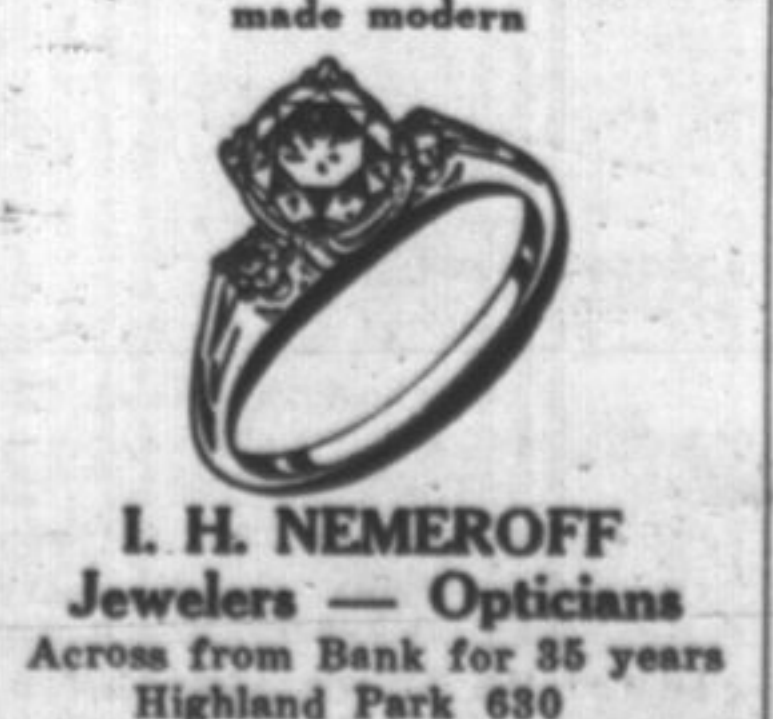
