Doll Collection At Lincoln Book, Gift Fair

Miss Katherine Waller, librarian for the Evanston Public School, will be guest speaker during the regular assembly period today, October 20, during the Lincoln School Book and Gift fair. She will display dolls from her extensive collection, numbering 900, and will tell many things of interest about them.

Her hobby started in 1930 with one or two dolls she purchased abroad, of which Francoise was the first. Many of the dolls are beloved characters from children's books, such as Alice in Wonderland, Little Women, Winnie the Pooh, Mother Goose and others. Over a period of years the dolls represented her travels and collecting from all parts of the globe, and she is continually adding to the collection many such real characters as a Guatemalan weaver with her baby asleep near the loom, an American Indian doll of corn husks, a pair from the Black Forest of Germany, a Chinese fisherman, a voodoo drummer from Haiti, a couple from the Tennessee mountains, a Johnny Appleseed doll, a flower vendor made by Jenny Comfort, and Mark Twain's Tom Sawyer and Huckleberry Finn.

Miss Wall has displayed her collection at many schools and for the benefit of such agencies as the Red Cross and Armenian orphans and war orphans of China. At one time she exhibited 600 of her dolls at the Treasury Center in the Commonwealth Edison Building. She will be ready to answer questions concerning her little friends that seem so real to her audience.

Modern Dance Classes To Be Held At Center

The Highland Park Recreation Dept. announces a series of Modern Dance Classes to be held at the Community Center each Wednesday.

The classes will include an exercise period for adults, classes for children of kindergarten age, for boys and girls of grade school age, a class for high school students as well as a special class designed to fit the free time of the Highland Park working girl.

"The Modern Dance" in its professional form is "Theatre Dance", employing characteristic American expression. It differs from the Ballet in that it has freed itself from classic technique and uses instead, any movements that fit the emotion or idea that the dancer wishes to portray.

Miss Madge Friedman, who has consented to conduct these classes, has studied dance with the leading artists of the field, has worked with Martha Graham, danced in the Repertory Theatre of Doris Humphrey and Charles Weidman as a member of their concert company and has performed two solo benefit concerts, besides appearing as a guest artist on a series of concerts at the Goodman Theatre. She has also been a soloist for a summer stock theatre in New Jersey.

Fire Chief Hennig also highly recommends more fire protection. "Most of the fires that we have been called to put out would never have spread so fast had there been a fire extinguisher handy. Make an Underwriters Laboratories approved fire extinguisher standard household equipment."

A Lecture on Christian Science

In a lecture given Tuesday evening by Elizabeth F. Norwood, C. S. B., in First Church of Christ Scientist, 387 Hazel Avenue, Highland Park, the lecturer spoke substantially as follows:

The Bible has posed this searching question, "Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in his holy place?" (Ps. 24:3.) The Psalmist answers (verse 4): "He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully." Christian Science teaches one how to attain clean hands and a pure heart, by healing him morally as well as physically. In fact, moral regeneration cannot be separated from physical healing in the practice of Christian Science. By attaining true spirituality through moral regeneration one becomes worthy to "stand in his holy place."

Since spirituality is a quality of God, man in God's likeness already possesses it; but the work of each one of us is to prove that in reality we are made in God's image, possessing by reflection this divine quality.

One day when great multitudes were gathered unto Jesus, "he went into a ship, and sat; and the whole multitude stood on the shore" (Matt. 13:2). And he spake this parable unto them: "The kingdom of heaven is like unto leaven, which a woman took, and hid in three measures of meal, till the whole was leavened" (Matt. 13:33).

Mrs. Eddy, the Discoverer of Christian Science

Mrs. Eddy has taken this leaven, the leaven of spiritual Truth, and hid it in science, theology, and medicine. This leaven is at work destroying all false theories as to science, theology, and medicine. This leaven will continue to work until science, theology, and medicine, as taught and demonstrated

by the Master, are understood by mankind. Then "the kingdoms of this world" (Rev. 11:15) will have become the kingdom of God.

One God

Christian Science teaches in accordance with the Scriptures that there is but one God, who is All-in-all; that He is all-power, all-presence, all Science. Christ Jesus

When John the Baptist, who confessed, "I am not the Christ" (John 1:20), saw Jesus coming unto him he said (1:29), "Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world." In the Glossary of Science and Health, Mrs. Eddy defines "Lamb of God" as follows (p. 590): "The spiritual idea of Love; self-immolation; innocence and purity; sacrifice."

Jesus was the human man, manifesting the divinity of the Christ. The Christ was the spiritual, eternal idea of God, invisible to the material senses, dwelling in divine Mind. As Mrs. Eddy says (Science and Health, p. 29), "The Christ dwelt forever an idea in the bosom of God."

Man Is an Individual, Spiritual Consciousness

Being an idea in divine Mind, man is an individual consciousness; conscious of all that God is conscious of, conscious of His perfection, and the reflected perfection of himself. He is conscious of true health, true happiness, and true relationship. He is conscious of the domination which God has bestowed on him, conscious of endless joy and freedom. The perfect man of God's creating is not subject to sin, disease, and death, but is subject to Life and Truth and Love.

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
