## And Still No Stassen Answers Or Here Are the Questions!

Well, another cold winter week eases in . . . and Presidential aspirant Harold Stassen still hasn't answered the 10 questions we gave him in written form a couple of weeks ago when the big Minnesotan visited our town.

We guess he's too busy.

At least that's what his secretary, Violet A. Crawford, telegraphs from St. Paul:

**"GOVERNOR STASSEN OUT OF STATE. WILL AIR MAIL YOU COPIES OF RECENT ADDRESSES WHICH MAY ANSWER YOUR QUESTIONS. APPEARS FROM SCHEDULE IMPOSSIBLE TO GET OTHER ANSWERS TO YOU ON TIME.**

### HERE, THEN, ARE QUESTIONS

So . . . following what we reported here last week . . . here are the 10 questions we asked Mr. Stassen. We hope he answers them one day soon.

We wonder if he will?

1. How can small but growing and progressive communities like Highland Park help keep the peace, Mr. Stassen?

2. You claim the Republican Party needs revitalizing? What specific steps do you propose for this revitalization?

3. You have called Senator Taft's foreign aid plans "penny-pinching." Just how far do you propose to go in this rebuild-Europe-campaign now gaining momentum? Do you believe dollars will stop bullets permanently?

4. Being an ex-GI yourself, and knowing how rotten, rugged and utterly stupid wars are, do you believe another war is ahead? If not, why? If so, what specific steps can we take to keep the peace other than so-called "Dollar Diplomacy"?

5. On your Russian tour you spent considerable time with Stalin. Is he the real power in Russia? Is he the man who can order armies to advance? Who does the Russian "quarterbacking"? Who over there falls the next international plays? What steps must the Anglo-American nations take to keep firm yet keep Stalin pleased and keep harmony in the world?

### ON MILITARY LEADERS . . .

6. Do you believe it is wise to have ex-military leaders (We

meant Annapolis and West Point trained men; real militarists.—Ed.) in key diplomatic and governmental posts? If so, why? If not, why?

7. We understand you are for universal military training. Why? Do you actually believe a tour of military duty improves American manhood? (Mr. Stassen touched on this subject in his Highland Park address. To a limited degree, he does advocate universal training. He believes we must be strong to back up our philosophy. Paraphrasing the thrice-elected Minnesota governor, Mr. Stassen said he doesn't believe we can keep the peace by becoming weak.—Ed.)

8. Do you believe an invincible air force will keep aggressor nations "in line"?

9. If you were elected President of the United States who would you want as your Secretary of State? (This question might have been too leading. But, if Mr. Stassen didn't want to answer it, he could of used that old political dodge, "No comment."—Ed.)

10. What part can the churches of American play in keeping the peace? (To date we've not heard Mr. Stassen say anything about the religious part of world peace. We believe the world-wide practicing of The Golden Rule would unquestionably bring lasting peace.—Ed.)
