### Local Women Voters Support Aid To Europe

The strength of the League of Women Voters will be behind the enactment of a stop-gap aid program to Europe as well as the entire European Recovery program. The League will also advocate that March 1. tax reduction be postponed until strong inflationary pressures have slackened. These decisions were made yesterday by the national board of the League at its weeklong session in Washington, and announced by Miss Anna Lord Strauss, president,

"The League board was of the belief that available facts indicate that the United States can furnish a considerable program of reconstruction aid to Europe without injuring its own economy," Miss for Europe, it was agreed by the Strauss said.
