The book also deals with tools and materials as well as the practice of using them. It includes a 60-page dictionary of carpentry terms, tables and charts needed by the carpenter.

Volume II, "Practical Construction," explains the actual step-bystep process in building the house discussed in Volume I. It includes a complete set of 8 blueprints to aid in the construction of the house, with instructions for reading. Other chapters are entitled: Insulation, Woods and Their Uses, Wood Fastenings, Carpentry as Trade, etc. Mr. Durbahn, a pioneer in the method of "learning something by doing it," now nationally recognized as the proper way to teach a trade subject, has drawn deeply upon his store of practical knowledge gained in 30 years of carpentry teaching.
