

**New Year's Corsages
Styled For the New Look**

Flowers will go modern for the New Year's celebrations, both in the styling of her corsage and the place to wear it. The florist's designer has a new treatment of the seasonable flowers to fully complement each facet of the new look in apparel. Gardenias, for example, deftly shaped in sequence follow the lines of the new flowing skirt; dainty sweetheart roses or light-pink carnations caught at the base of a plunging V-neckline. An excitingly new arrangement of full-blown roses, in a color suggested by the florist, will gracefully accent the new nipped-in waistline. An orchid sets high on the shoulder of a dinner dress, or gets perched at a vantage point in the sleek hairdo. Orchids, incidentally, are in the best supply in five years, and the lavender types are reasonable indeed.

There is plenty of scope, too, in the other flowers of the season—in the green orchids which are perfect for many costumes; in camellias, sweet peas, violets, euphorbia and blue irises. And it's a good idea to tell the florist what you're wearing to the party, but give him ample time to style the corsage that will do the most for your costume.

Fight Against Infantile

Batavia, Ill., Dec. 15—Sister Elizabeth Kenny, vacationing at

her home in Brisbane, Australia, in a cablegram to Rodney H. Brandon, Illinois chairman of the Kenny Foundation, urged him to send an appeal to Illinois nurses to join her fight against the crippling effects of infantile paralysis.

In responding to her request today, Brandon announced that already five applications had been received for scholarship awards valued at \$5,000 each, for the two-year course beginning next January 5 at the Sister Kenny Institute, Minneapolis.

Brandon explained that the second year of the training could be completed in Chicago where a Kenny polio treatment clinic is soon to be opened, or at the Sister Kenny Clinic in Centralia, Ill. The current Kenny drive in Illinois is being conducted to raise funds for these purposes. Scholarships are payable at the rate of \$200 a month for the first year and \$225 a month for the second year.

Nurses wishing to take this training, Brandon added, should apply to the Sister Kenny Foundation, 537 S. Dearborn St., Chicago, Ill.

**Eradicate Tuberculosis
By Tracking Down Each Individual Case**

The importance of finding every case of tuberculosis in order to eradicate the disease from Lake county was emphasized by Dr. Theo. S. Proxmire of Lake Forest, President of the Lake County Tuberculosis Association.

"Because Tuberculosis is a community disease spread by persons who have it," said Dr. Proxmire, "we cannot hope to eradicate it until we locate persons already infected, place them under treatment, and at the same time take the necessary precautions to prevent them from spreading the disease to members of their families, their friends and neighbors.

"Today," Dr. Proxmire continued, "we have the means of finding the unknown cases of tuberculosis in Lake county through the chest clinics sponsored by our Lake County Tuberculosis Association, mass x-ray surveys with our Mobile X-ray Unit, and our tuberculin testing surveys in the

schools of Lake county."

As a beginning in community x-raying, Deerfield entered into such a program Dec. 4th. The success of this survey was largely due to the enthusiasm and leadership of W. E. Sheehan, Supt. of Schools, Mrs. Miriam Easton, School Nurse, Parent Teacher Assn., Civic clubs and interested citizens of Deerfield. During one of the worst storms of the Season, The Mobile Unit was located at Deerfield and nearly 400 adult residents received x-rays. Deerfield has done well in leading its community in this x-ray survey.
