Game With Brockton Highlight 1921 Season

Probably the most famous foot-
 ball game in Highland Park high
 school's history was played in
 November of the year 1921, when
 Highland Park, then known as
 Deerfield high school, traveled to
 Brockton, Mass., to play the
 mighty Brockton team.

Highland Park, the champion of
 the Chicago Suburban league that
 year, traveled 1,000 miles to meet
 their opponents, who also had not
 witnessed a defeat during the sea-
 son.

The game was played on a snowy
 November 24th, with about 4,000
 spectators who were eager for both
 teams. The enthusiasts of the
 Thanksgiving holiday game saw a
 19-14 win by Brockton over Deer-
 field high. Deerfield was in there
 fighting throughout the whole
 game, and Deerfield's coach, J. L.
 Rothacker, was not dissatisfied,
 for not a school in the country
 could have beaten the powerful
 Brockton team.

Under the captainship of Roy
 Randeil, the eastern team was lead-
 to a defeatless season.

One of the highlights of the
 game came when Stewart of Deer-
 field ran 90 yards for a touch-
 down, dodging the heavy Brock-
 ton players as he ran, thus making
 the score 13-7.

The total receipts of the game
 amounted to \$4304.20.

The game was at the time the
 biggest intersectional football
 game of the season.

Vassar Offers Two Scholarships

The Chicago Vassar club is of-
 fering two Vassar scholarships of
 \$1,000.00 each to students in the
 Chicago area who will enter col-
 lege as first year students in Sep-
 tember, 1948.

The successful candidates for
 the awards will receive scholarship
 aid from the college throughout
 their course (the amount varying
 in accordance with individual
 need) if they maintain the stand-
 ard required.

Records of outside activities will
 be considered as well as scholastic
 standing in awarding these schol-
 arships. To be eligible for a schol-
 arship a girl must be unable to fi-
 nance a Vassar education without
 it.
