Mary Lu Sanborn Receives Promotion In Special Service Work

Miss Mary Lu Sanborn, daughter of the Charles A. Sanborns of 817 Ridgewood drive, who flew to Germany last June, to engage in Special Service work with the Army of Occupation, has been made Assistant Director of Recreation at the U. S. Constabulary school at Sonthofen. Prior to this she did recreational work in Munich and Bad Tolz.

The Sonthofen school was originally built by Hitler as a training school for teen age German youths as future party leaders. In 1945 it was used by the French army, and after the division of Germany into zones, it was adopted by the U. S. army as a training school where, each six weeks, about 1000 soldiers are given training in border patrol work. During the six months which

Miss Sanborn has spent in Germany, she has taken many interesting trips. Among them was a trip on the Rhine, taken in what was formerly Hitler's private boat. Another trip was to Berchtesgaden, the so-called "love nest" of Hitler and Eva. She also attended one of the famous trials at Berchtesgaden, and visited the spot in the Swiss Alps where many of the national Ski contests are held.

Another interesting trip was taken to Oberammergau, where the well-known Passion Play was held for many years before the war. This part of southern Germany, she reports, shows very little damage from the war, as there was very little fighting there. She writes that the winter is quite severe, with quantities of snow.
