Dr. Franzblau To Preach At Congregation Israel

"The Job Nobody Wants" is the title of the sermon to be delivered by Dr. Abraham N. Franzblau when he visits North Shore Congregation Israel on Friday night, January 16.

Dr. Franzblau is the Dean of the School of Religious Education of the Hebrew Union College and a recognized leader in his field. For some years he has been principal of the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers in New York City and from 1931 to 1946 was Professor of Religious Education and Pastoral Psychiatry at Hebrew Union College. During the war Dr. Franzblau served in the office of the Surgeon General, Washington, D. C. He had charge of the dissemination to the civilian population via motion pictures, magazines and radio, of information about health and medical matters vital to their participation in the war effort.
