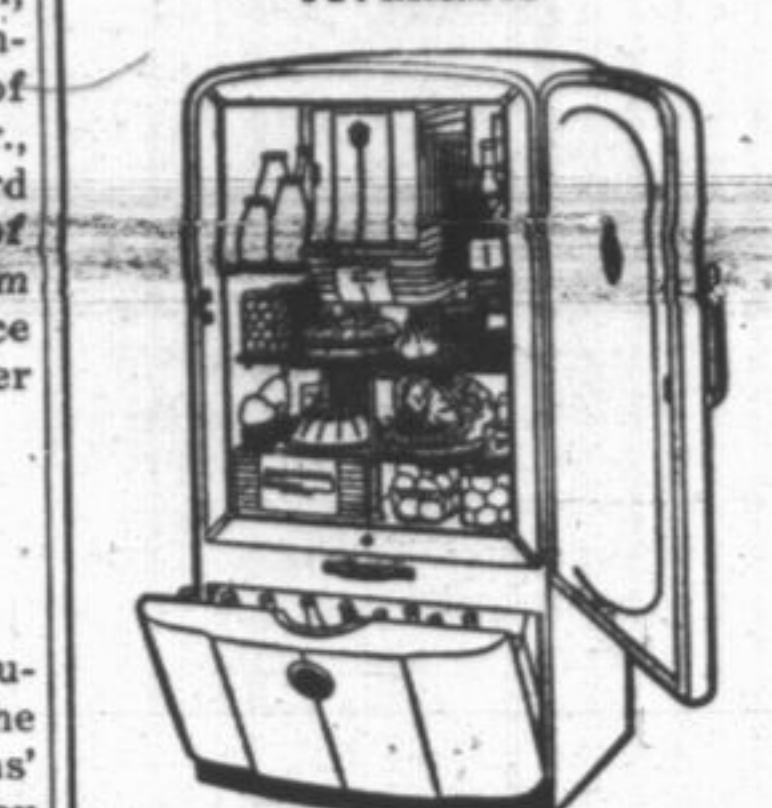
Top Lady Bowler
