**Veterinarians Battle Animal Diseases**

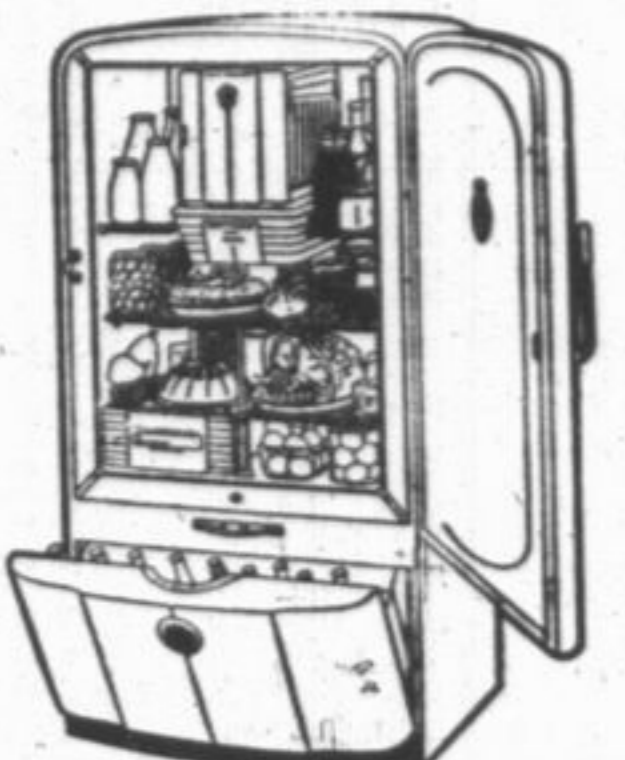
