Congressman Church On Housing Construction

In a release from Washington, Congressman Ralph E. Church, (R), 13th District, Illinois, states, "If we are to find homes for our veterans and civilians and relieve the critical housing shortage over the country, it is important that we take prompt and effective action". "I have introduced H.R. 5142, which will stimulate investment in apartment houses, dwellings, etc." "This measure," said Congressman Church, "will permit Scouts To Demonstrate investors to deduct depreciation allowance from gross income over a period of 20 years or more, as the taxpayer shall elect, instead of the 50 years now required in the case of apartment buildings; and thus investment in such properties will be more attractive.

"There are of course other facilities which will benefit from en actment of the bill, in addition to the above," said Congressman Church, "but my principal and immediate purpose is to encourage construction of apartments and dwellings in order to provide adequate housing for the thousands seeking relief, as well as to encourage production."
