Congressman Church On Housing Construction

In a release from Washington, Congressman Ralph E. Church, (R), 13th District, Illinois, states, "If we are to find homes for our veterans and civilians and relieve the critical housing shortage over the country, it is important that we take prompt and effective action." "I have introduced H.R. 5142, which will stimulate investment in apartment houses, dwellings, etc." "This measure," said Congressman Church, "will permit investors to deduct depreciation allowance from gross income over a period of 20 years or more, as the taxpayer shall elect, instead of the 50 years now required in the case of apartment buildings; and thus investment in such properties will be more attractive.

"There are of course other facilities which will benefit from enactment of the bill, in addition to the above," said Congressman Church, "but my principal and immediate purpose is to encourage construction of apartments and dwellings in order to provide adequate housing for the thousands seeking relief, as well as to encourage production."

Deerfield Woman's Club Presents Mrs. A. R. Heisler

The Home and Education Department of the Deerfield Woman's Club, Mrs. Robert W. Clynne, chairman, is presenting on February 10, 1948, in the club room of the Deerfield Grammar School, Mrs. Anne R. Heisler of Chicago who will discuss "Psychology in Every Day Living." Mrs. Heisler was born and raised in Colorado, and after graduation from college became very active in Women's clubs. She served for four years on the Americanization committee, and in that capacity established Americanization classes throughout the state.

In 1921 Mrs. Heisler won National recognition when she competed in an essay contest, and wrote the winning essay entitled "Safety on the Highways." She was awarded \$500.00 in cash and a trip to Washington, New York and Boston with all expenses paid. She was entertained at the White House and met President Harding.

In 1922 Mrs. Heisler was chosen by the State Legislature and a committee of 17 Superintendents over the state to assist Arthur Chapman prepare a History of Colorado.

She is a member of the Rogers Park Women's Club and served for six years as co-chairman of the Education committee. She will be glad to answer questions following the lecture.
