## Says Many "Miracles" Are "Divinely Natural"

On Sunday afternoon, February 1, Cecil F. Denton, C.S., of New York City, a member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., delivered a lecture on Christian Science entitled "Christian Science: The Availability of Divine Law". Speaking in the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Highland Park, he said in part:

"During Paul's first missionary journey into Asia Minor, as recorded in the fourteenth chapter of the book of Acts, he encountered a "certain man at Lystra, impotent in his feet, being a cripple from his mother's womb, who never had walked." Paul evidently discerned the man's receptivity to the Christ, Truth, and thereupon healed him of his infirmity. This immediate restoration to normalcy astounded the people of Lystra who thought that the gods had come down to them in the likeness of men. They then proceeded to name Paul and his fellow apostle, Barnabas, after their Greek gods, Mercurius and Jupiter, and to bring oxen and garlands unto them to make sacrifice. The apostles, however, rejected their idolatrous worship, declaring, "We also are men of like passions with you, and preach unto you that ye should turn from these vanities unto the living God, which made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and all things that are therein" (Acts 14:15).

"As one of the definitions of the word "miracle" Webster's dictionary quotes from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, as follows: "That which is divinely natural, but must be learned humanly; a phenomenon of Science" (p. 591). From beginning to end the Scriptures are full of accounts of wonderful events coming to pass which by their very nature set aside so-called material law and revealed the law of God with whom all things are possible.

"Times without number mankind has witnessed proofs that there is indeed no other God "that can deliver after this sort." Elijah and Elisha and other prophets knew the power of God; and the master Physician, Christ Jesus, and his disciples were so conscious of God's ever-presence that mighty acts were an everyday occurrence. These exhibitions of God's power were demonstrated for nearly three hundred years following Jesus' ascension, when the church lost sight of his healing mission until it was revealed to this age through Christian Science. This religion is Christian because it is based on the life and teaching of Christ Jesus, and it is Science because it is a systematic and demonstrable understanding of divine law. This religion declares with Daniel: "I thought it good to shew the signs and wonders that the high God hath wrought toward me. How great are his wonders! His kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and His dominion is from generation to generation" (Dan. 4:2, 3).

## Rabbi Richard Hertz To Preach At Temple

caused the practice to be discontinued. In its last analysis, these parking meters installed in Highland Park, or any community with similar conditions, is simply a revenue producing measure inflicted upon the already overtaxed and overburdened motorist. In fact, Mr. Cole's statement that these meters will produce an income of \$4.08 to \$6.66 per meter per month confirms that view.  
203 meters at \$4.08 per month produces \$828.24, and for a year, \$9,938.88; while at the higher rate suggested of \$6.66 per meter per month the income would be \$1,351.98, or for a year, \$16,223.76.

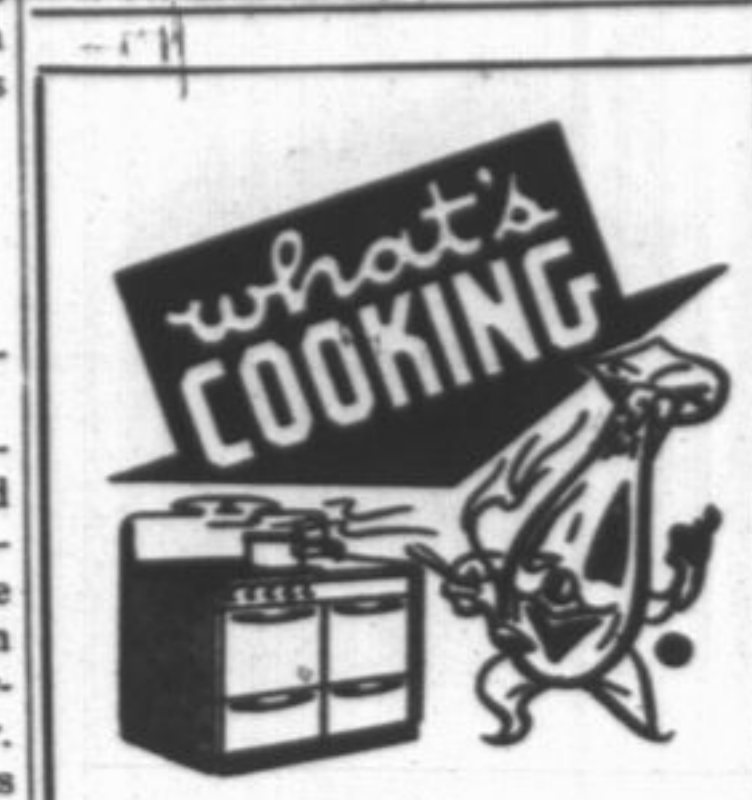
Who pays these sums? The citizens of Highland Park. And who gets these sums? The city of Highland Park.  
What do they do with it? That question has not been asked or answered, but it is conceivable it would go into the corporate fund, to be used for any purpose whatsoever that the city council might decide on and not exclusively for the repair and maintenance of the streets and highways.

The citizens owning automobiles are already subject to many taxes and penalties imposed upon them because of their ownership and use of an automobile. There is a federal tax on the purchase price; there is a state tax or license, for so-called registration plates; the city of Highland Park taxes for what is called vehicle license. There is a personal property tax; there is a federal tax of 1 1/2 c a gallon on gasoline and oil, and a state tax of 3c a gallon and there are taxes on tires and tubes and accessories, all of which, when added up, comes to a considerable sum.

Now it is suggested, having paid all these fees, including the Highland Park vehicle tax—which really ought to give the citizen the right to use the streets—that they be charged an additional \$9,000 or \$16,000 a year for the use of the streets for legitimate purposes to enable them to buy their supplies and the merchants to sell them and keep in business, causing, in addition, inconvenience, delays and other harrassments.  
It is not suggested that the Northwestern Railway or the North Shore Electric be inflicted with parking meters when they stop their trains; nor are taxicabs or motor buses; nor is it suggested that taxicabs or motor buses; be also subjected to parking meters, nor should they be.

The installation of these meters should be resisted by all the citizens of Highland Park, and particularly by the storekeepers. No benefit can come from their installation, and the additional cost to the motorist is indicated above.  
Write to your councilmen today and urge the repeal of the ordinance.
