**Progress in The Lake County Juvenile Court**  
Glancing through newspapers today one is constantly confronted with headlines of juvenile criminal offenses. The seriousness of the crimes vary in degree. They are a source of concern to everyone, and it is therefore pleasing to note the constructive and beneficial changes that have been instigated recently in one of our county juvenile courts.

Minard E. Hulse, newly elected judge of Lake County, whose duties include the headings of all juvenile cases in the county, has introduced changes of great benefit in court procedures.

His first step upon taking over his court duties was to employ the services of the National Probation Association, an organization whose professional staff works out standards for juvenile courts and offers suggestions, when requested, to court officials.

To assist Mrs. Mary Funk, the only probation officer of the court, whose duties included the care of both adult and juvenile cases, Judge Hulse appointed an additional probation officer, Cornelius Trowbridge, a man highly experienced and well qualified for the position. Clerical help was added, so that the probation officers could spend more time working with the children.

For more intelligent treatment of cases, Judge Hulse now employs the services of a psychiatrist.

He has instigated a plan for private hearings in the judge's chambers with the children and those directly concerned, in place of hearings in open court. Minor cases can now also be directly reported to the probation officers without a formal petition. These changes make it possible to work with the children before they get into more serious difficulties.

The improved court procedures have directly influenced local cases that are referred to the court. Mrs. Marian G. Fisher, Executive Secretary of Family Service of Highland Park, reports that the children that have been referred to the county court during the past year have been carefully watched and followed up, with successful results.

The changes in court procedures have been made possible because of the cooperation of the County Board in voting additional funds at the request of Judge Hulse.

According to Judge Hulse, more thought must be given to other changes. For instance, delinquent boys are still kept in the county jail with older offenders. However, as time goes on, it is hoped further improvements will be made.

A total of 591 hearings were held in 1947. The court budget resulting from the additional help employed, has necessarily been increased, but the increased expenditure has been well repaid in a better understanding of the children and a more satisfactory treatment of their problems.

The Highland Park League of Women Voters for several years has been keenly interested in the progress of the Lake County juvenile court, and it is with a sense of satisfaction and pleasure that League members have watched the recent improvements in the court's procedures.
