Glancing through newspapers today one is constantly confronted with headlines of juvenile criminal offenses. The seriousness of the crimes vary in degree. They ar a source of concern to everyone and it is therefore pleasing to note the constructive and beneficial changes that have been instigated recently in one of our county juvenile courts.

judge of Lake County, whose duties include the headings of all Guild. juvenile cases in the county, has introduced changes of great benefit in court procedures.

his court duties was to employ the Ohlwein. services of the National Probation Association, an organization whose professional staff works out standards for juvenile courts and offers suggestions, when requested, to court officials.

To assist Mrs. Mary Funk, the only probation officer of the court, whose duties included the care of both adult and juvenile cases, Judge Hulse appointed an additional probation officer, Cornelius Trowbridge, a man highly experienced and well qualified for the position. Clerical help was added, so that the probation officers could spend more time working with the children.

For more intelligent treatment of cases, Judge Hulse now employs the services of a psychiatrist.

He has instigated a plan for private hearings in the judge's chambers with the children and those directly concerned, in place of hearings in open court. Minor cases can now also be directly reported to the probation officers without a formal petition.. These changes make it possible to work with the children before they get into more serious difficulties.
