**Episcopalians To Launch Unique Relief Campaign**

The members of Trinity Church, 355 Laurel Avenue, will hear by radio the voice of their Presiding Bishop, the Most Reverend Henry Knox Sherrill, next Sunday during the eleven o'clock service as he appeals to them and Episcopalians throughout the country for world relief.

During 1947 American Churches gave over five million dollars in cash and more than fifteen million pounds of supplies of every nature to help the war ravaged peoples of Europe and Asia. Through the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, one of several agencies, Episcopalians contributed more than one million dollars and thousands of tons of supplies.

In view of the needs that increase rather than decrease, the Episcopal Church will attempt to secure most of the million dollars for 1948 in one day. The service at the local Church will begin and continue as usual up to 11:30 a.m. when the Presiding Bishop's voice will be heard by radio in this and thousands of churches from coast to coast through an unprecedented combination of network and independent radio stations. Literally no part of the entire country will not be reached by Bishop Sherrill's statement about the bitter needs of the peoples of Europe and Asia.

This campaign is believed to be the first important relief effort of this year by any Church and it is the only Church effort ever to be inaugurated with the assistance of such an extraordinary radio arrangement.

Despite Government aid abroad, according to United Nations' experts, two-thirds of the people in Europe and Asia are not getting enough to eat. More than a billion of them are living close to the starvation line; 40 per cent of those near starvation are children under fifteen years of age. Said the United Nations statement: "This is a picture of a dying generation."

**Dr. Robt. Coghill To Head Lake County American Cancer Society Campaign**

Dr. Robert D. Coghill of Abbott Laboratories, North Chicago, has been appointed chairman of Lake County in the 1948 fund-raising campaign to be conducted by the Illinois Division, American Cancer Society, it was announced by Edward Foss Wilson, general chairman of the drive.

The campaign, which opens in April, will raise funds to fight cancer through three mediums: research, education and service to cancer victims.

As chairman of Lake County, Dr. Coghill will select campaign chairmen for each of the eleven communities into which the county will be divided for the drive, which are: Deerfield-Bannockburn, Grays Lake, Highland Park, Lake Bluff, Lake Forest, Lake Zurich, Libertyville, Mundelein, Vernon Township, Waukegan-North Chicago and Zion.

Dr. Coghill, a widely-known scientist and director of research at Abbott Laboratories lives at 701 Prospect Avenue, Lake Bluff.
