Stanley W. McKee Reelected President Of Principals' Roundtable

For the second consecutive year, Stanley W. McKee, Principal of the Lincoln School, has been unanimously elected President of the Principals' Roundtable of Northern Illinois.

The Principals' Roundtable embraces the area in metropolitan Chicago. Its meetings are held each month in the city. Not only does the group serve as a clearing house for many administrative problems but it also serves as a research agency in elementary education.

At the present time the Principals' Roundtable, directed by Mr. McKee as President and ex-officio member of its Editorial Board, is conducting a study which is gaining national prominence. The study relates to defining the status of the elementary school principal. It is unique in that no group of educators working in the field have previously conducted such a survey.

Upon completion, the study will be published in one of several outstanding educational publications.

Other Highland Park principals who are members of this group are Mr. R. J. Naegele, Ravinia School, and Mr. Arno Wehle, West Ridge School.
