North Shore Line Reports Loss For 1947

Declining passenger revenues, occasioned primarily by loss of post-war military and civilian traf-

fic incident to diminishing activities at Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes, resulted in a net loss of \$95,791.46 during 1947 for the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railway Company (the North Shore Line) and its wholly owned rail subsidiary, according to report submitted to stockholders at annual meeting of the railroad held in Chicago today, Monday, March 22, 1948.

The total accumulated deficit since November 1, 1946, date of reorganization, amounts to \$138,846.49.
