"Mayerling" Tells A Historic Drama

The romance and nostalgia of old Vienna appear in the French film masterpiece "Mayerling" to be presented by North Shore Chapter, American Veterans Committee, at Winetka Community House next Wednesday, April 14 at eight-fifteen.

Based on the true story of Archduke Rudolph, heir to the imperial crown of Austria-Hungary in 1888, the movie stars Charles Boyer and Danielle Darrieux as Rudolph and the lovely, ethereal Baroness Vetsera. The story is set in the waning days of Vienna's glory as the capital of central Europe, with the rebellious young archduke struggling to win the girl of his choice and revitalize the tottering Habsburg throne.

The AVC's movie committee is headed by Bill Steel, Winnetka, and includes Dick Ginzburger, Winnetka; Jim Hirsch, Glencoe, and Ted Loeb, Highland Park.

At last reports the committee planned to include "Round Trip," a short film dramatizing international trade produced by the 20th Century Foundation, in the program. "Advance ticket sales have been spurred by news that the prints of Mayerling will be destroyed within a few weeks to clear the way for a Hollywood version of the classic," Steel announced this week.
