We can help to end this waste of life by making funds available for the cancer control program of the Illinois Division."

Mr. Engelhard who is well known in the community, expressed confidence that Deerfield will do its share toward the cancer control program by reaching its goal in the April campaign.

Changes In New Rent Control Law

The main changes in the new Rent Control Law are as follows: A 60-day written notice must now be served on a tenant to be evicted instead of a 30-day notice. This does not apply to non-payment of rent or nuisance. A landlord may have a tenant evicted for his own occupancy or for occupancy of his immediate family, such as son, daughter, father, mother, grandfather, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, etc.

Sleeping rooms in private homes have been decontrolled, provided there are no more than two tenants in the house, that is to say—one room may be rented to a couple or two rooms may be rented to two separate persons.

The opportunity to negotiate with your tenant for an immediate increase up to 15 per cent has

been renewed. In order to obtain this increase, the tenant must be given a written lease up to December 31, 1949, or longer. A copy of this lease signed by both landlord and tenant, must be filed with the rent office. A report must be filed with this office if the tenant moves out before the lease expires.

You may still obtain a raise in rent without giving a lease, by filing a simple form showing your

increase in expenses, such as taxes, heating costs, outside painting, new roof, furnace, repairs, etc.
