**Women Voters Make Survey of State Mental Institutions**  
 Hospitals Badly Overcrowded  
 A recent survey by the Illinois Society for Mental Hygiene indicates that there is much need for improvement in our Illinois State Mental hospitals. Supported by the taxpayer's money, these hospitals are badly in need of funds for adequate care of patients. Statistics show that Illinois hospitals are overcrowded by the number of 14,000 patients, while new patients increase in number at the rate of 1000 per year.  
 The survey finds that there is no separate building for children, and that the personnel is insufficient, with inadequate pay, so that professional workers are constantly leaving State service for higher pay.  
**Women Voters To Study Situation**  
 In order to try to improve these conditions the Highland Park League of Women Voters has organized a committee of local organizations to study the situation. Mrs. Douglas Boyd, Social Welfare Chairman of the Highland Park League, is chairman of the committee. According to Mrs. Boyd, three State organizations, the American Legion, the Illinois Federated Women's Clubs and the American Association of University Women, have agreed to cooperate in promoting interest in starting local committees.  
**Local Groups To Lead Support**  
 The following Highland Park groups are giving their support to the project: the Highland Park Churches, American Legion Auxiliary, Family Service, YWCA, Infant Welfare, Highland Park high school PTA and the Immaculate Conception PTA. Four meetings have been held, to date, including two trips to institutions. At one of the meetings, Reverend Wilson, pastor of the First United Evangelical church of Highland Park, gave an interesting account of his experiences several years ago as chaplain at Dixon State hospital.  
**Final Meeting On April 19**  
 The final meeting will be held on April 19 at 1:30 p.m. at the Highland Park library. "At this meeting there will be an analysis and summary of information gathered on the trips to Elgin and Dixon State hospitals," Mrs. Boyd said. "Plans will be made for visits to our representatives in the State Assembly. We shall present the situation to them and ask for their support in making improvements."

 Dr. Robert Mustell of Chicago, the official examining physician of the C.Y.O. and Golden Gloves, pointed out the physical advantages of boxing in youth today under supervised leadership, in his talk Saturday evening.  
 Mayor Patton, Chief of Police Ed Patten and Commander Albert Bork of the American Legion were honored guests of the evening and expressed their congratulations to the boys.  
 This was the wind-up for the season for the Club until next fall, according to Mel Mullins, Athletic Director.
