RAVINIA TEACHER'S ARTICLES APPEAR IN CURRENT MAGAZINES

Wendall W. Haner, teacher at Ravinia School, is the author of writings appearing in the current issues of three national education magazines.

The latest number of THE CLEARING HOUSE, high school teachers' magazine, contains his article "The Teachers Take Over at Matoor," in which Mr. Haner outlines a plan for a more democratic administration of American school systems. Scott, Foresman and Company, who included an adaptation of one of his previous CLEARING HOUSE articles in a textbook published last year, have recently requested permission to use the material in an international edition and in a new text for high school students.

The JOURNAL OF THE NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION published a poem by the local teacher in its March issue. Written as a parody on "The Raven" by Edgar Allan Poe, the poem is a humorous description of the troubles and problems encountered by superintendents of schools. It is entitled "The Superintendent's Ravin'."

"I'd Sorta Like to Teach," another poem by Mr. Haner, appears in the April issue of YOUNG AMERICA TEACHER. It takes the form of a commentary by an experienced teacher on progress in education.

Mr. Haner, who formerly taught in the high school at St. Joseph, Michigan, joined the staff of Ravinia School last September. He is a graduate of Hillsdale College and of the University of Michigan, where he received his Master's Degree. His stories, articles, and poems have appeared in a dozen national education magazines and in several Canadian journals.
