Mr. Gibson, Civilian Aid to the Secretary of War during World War II, will speak on "U.M.T. and Race Relations". He will draw on his experiences in Washington as top consultant on Negro problems in the Army as well as his present information on the proposed Universal Military Training Bill.

A Chicago corporation and insurance company lawyer, Mr. Gibson is a member of Mayor Kennelly's Land Clearance Commission, which is guiding the operation of Chicago's slum clearance program for which \$30,000,000 was voted last fall.

With Fowler McCormick, he is co-chairman of the United Negro Collection Fund in Chicago. He is also on the board of the Provident Hospital Association and a director of the Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Company.

36 years old, married, and the father of one child, he is a graduate of the University of Chicago law school, and was an all-state tackle when he attended high school in Columbus, Ohio.
