a maze of figures intended to convince me to vote either for or against the Tax Referendum next Saturday.

This I know. Our recent city administrations have handled our affairs both efficiently and economically as evidenced by our tax rate which is lower than that of many of my friends in comparable suburbs. I also know that when a committee of one hundred of our citizens from every part of Highland Park has studied the Tax Revenue problem and has recommended a Referendum solution I am willing to accept their judgment.

I believe them when they say that the city will levy only enough—not all—of the new rate to pay for the services we are now getting. I also believe that they knew what they were doing in setting the new rate to provide a cushion against a possible decrease in valuations or increase in costs in the future.

My family and I are voting "YES" in next Saturday's referendum. I urge every right-thinking Highland Parker to do likewise.

duction threatens to be even greater if our present tax valuation is cut by the Lake County Board of Review and the State Department of Revenue, and every indication is that it will be cut by a considerable amount.

Obviously, if nothing is done about this loss of revenue, the services it pays for will have to be reduced. This would mean less police and fire protection, less street maintenance.

In a statement released this week, Chairman Hotchkiss said, "The new tax rate to be voted on in next Saturday's referendum will restore our city's freedom to collect the income needed to continue our city services, and will allow a reasonable leeway for increasing income in the future, if it should be needed because of rising costs or added services we may need. Your approval of the new tax rate need not increase the taxes we have paid for city services."

"Please remember that the city will levy only a part of the new rate to cover the cost of the service we are getting. This is unlike our levy for 1947, when the city asked for \$248,074.20 for the Corporate and Street and Bridge Funds, when it knew that it would get no more than \$118,000 which our existing tax rate would produce. Whenever a tax rate is restricted below actual needs, municipalities generally levy more than they know they can get, in order to be sure of getting the maximum amount permissible under the rate. However, when the rate is high enough to produce what is needed, the city levies only what it actually expects to get. This is illustrated by our school levies (whose maximum permissible rates have already been increased by referendum) which are based on actual need only—and are much lower than the amount permitted by the maximum school tax rate."

"No one wants to increase city taxes, but we cannot permit the city's revenue to fall below its operating costs. Be sure to vote YES on both propositions in next Saturday's referendum!"

A booklet explaining the tax revenue crisis has been mailed earlier this week to every home in Highland Park.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find a complete list of polling places for the referendum, which differ in some cases from the Congressional polling places used in the primary last week.

### Free Cancer Clinic Located in Waukegan

One of the uses to which funds collected in the current cancer drive will be put is the support of diagnostic clinics, which aim to save lives by early diagnosis and prompt and proper treatment.

A clinic to serve the Lake county area is located at the Victory Memorial hospital, 1324 N. Sheridan Rd., Waukegan.

When an appointment is made through a family physician, the clinic personnel will know in advance what type of diagnosis will be necessary and can have on hand the physicians who specialize in that particular field. Services of the physicians attending the clinic are free, but if x-ray or other technical examination is necessary, the patient is expected to pay for it if he is financially able to do so. If not, funds will be provided for that purpose.

Many physicians are cooperating with the clinic and are giving their time to make it successful. Six or more are present at each session.

The county drive, which will continue through April, is part of a nation-wide campaign for 16 million dollars.

Edward J. Loewenthal heads a committee of eight campaign workers in Highland Park. His assistants are Joseph B. Garnett, Dr. William E. Looby, Dr. Morley D. McNeal, Msgr. Joseph P. Morrison, Frank F. Selfridge, Moses E. Shire and Dr. Gustave F. Weinfeld.
