Memorial Gym At Elm Place Is Dream Come True

Three months have passed since the dedication of the Arthur H. Swanson Memorial gymnasium, enough time to test the practicality and prove the worth of the "dream come true" at Elm Place school, Dr. C. O. Dahle, District 107 superintendent, said this week.

No longer do girls and boys have to share one gym or alternate weeks as they use the lunch room or auditorium stage, he said, and no longer are the girls limited in their after-school program as the boys crowd a busy schedule in one available gym. In schools throughout the country, lack of adequate space and facilities have made well rounded physical education programs all but impossible, but to a great extent these inadequacies have been eliminated at Elm Place, according to Dr. Dahle.

The following program has been made possible through the use of the two gymnasias:

Both boys and girls have completed intramural basketball schedules. The boys in the 6th, 7th, and 8th grades played a total of 12 games each with a total of eight teams participating. The girls had a double round robin of games between rooms in the same grade level.

A number of inter-school games have been played by the boys. The 6th grade played 3, the 7th played 6, and the 8th, played 12. The girls had several "play" days with other schools at which time basketball was played.

Boys' intramural volleyball leagues have recently finished their schedules. The Handsome 8 won the 6th grade tourney with a total of 5 wins and 1 loss; the Blue Devils and Badgers tied for second with 3 wins and 3 losses. In the 7th and 8th grade tourney the Tappers finished on top with 5 wins and one loss, while the Set-Ups and Biffers tied for second.

The girls also had a number of volleyball, newcomb, and turkball games after school. Competition started down as low as the 4th and 5th grades with Turkball. The 6th and 7th played newcomb, and the 8th played volleyball.

Badminton was introduced into the regular physical education class work for both boys and girls. The girls have just completed a badminton tourney held after school and during activity period with 40 girls taking part.
