## Show Boat At The Shubert

Rodgers and Hammerstein's new production of "Show Boat" now at the Shubert Theatre, Chicago, has settled into the HIT class. The word of mouth advertising, the wonderful reviews from the Chicago critics, and the very fine company, are credited for the unusual interest.

"Show Boat" is an institution, an important contribution to American history. In the vivid sequence and tuneful cadence it portrays several great periods in American life—periods and incidents that exerted a powerful and benevolent influence upon the American people.

It was at the Ziegfeld Theatre in New York City that "Show Boat" originally was presented, the famous Jerome Kern music and Oscar Hammerstein 2nd book and lyrics, based on Edna Ferber's novel, on the night of December 27th, 1927. Mr. Ziegfeld revived it on May 20th, 1932, at the old Casino Theatre. The present Rodgers and Hammerstein production of "Show Boat" recently completed a 61-week run at the Ziegfeld Theatre where the play was originally produced.

Mr. Hammerstein, who, with the late Jerome Kern, planned the new version, emphasizes that it is not a revival in the usual sense but rather "a 1948 approach to a musical show of 1927." The production was staged by Hassard Short in settings designed by Howard Bay with costumes created by Lucinda Ballard. Helen Tamiris devised the dances; Mr. Hammerstein directed the book; and the orchestrations, arranged by Russell Bennett, are under the baton of Frederick Dvorchak with orchestra of forty.

Very few changes have been made in either the text or the music.

Featured in the cast of 128 actors, singers, and dancers are Billy House, Captain Andy; Pamela Caveness, Magnolia; Norwood Smith, Ravenal; Martha King, Julie; Sammy White, Frank; Bertha Belmore, Parthy; Clare Alden, Ellie; LeVerne French,

Sam; Fred Brookins, Steve; Helen Dowdy, Queenie; William C. Smith, Joe; Fred Adath as Vallon; Jack Daley, Jim; and Sara Floyd, Landlady.
