Yet next month, on June 15th, two able policemen will be dismissed and one police car put in storage.

Why?

To save money.

And why again?

Because Highland Park hasn't enough money to pay for adequate police and fire protection; street maintenance; and lots of other services vital to a growing town.

Running Backwards . . .

Experts report it'll be a year before there'll be another vote on taxes.

During these next 365 days, Highland Park will 3 A's - 1 B march to the rear, leaving its citizens and their property unsafe and, at times, completely un-protected.

Sad commentary?

Yes.

What's to be done?

It's up to us . . , all of us.

Must Have More Funds . . .

Our city must have more funds.

And we'll keep right on bringing this subject up until something is done about it.
