Exhibit Has Sea Flavor At Library

Timed with the first appearance of white sails flecking Lake Michigan's springtime blue, the Highland Park Public Library this week dressed ship with a show of nautical things collected by the North Shore Yacht Club.

In six exhibition cases grouped around the entrance are stowed charts, flags, compasses, ship's lantern and bells. Marlinespike, fid and sailmaker's palm—familiar in fiction—are here in real life. A score of books broken out from the library's sea chest await the off-watch reader, including Captain Joshua Slocum's famous journal of the first single-handed voyage around the world in 1894-'98, seagoing volumes by Highland Park's recent visitor Captain Alan Villiers, RNVR, and full-rigged yarns from C.S. Forester's salty pen.

Credit for arranging the exhibition belongs to two energetic Deerfielders, Mrs. Hubert Kelley and Mrs. Compton Pearson. Another Deerfield sailor, Fred Nolte, contributed charts used on his recent West Indies sailing cruise, together with Winslow Homer prints, shells and sea ferns from his souvenirs. Wellington Quirk, also of Deerfield, Vice-Commandore of the club, loaned a miniature figurehead of the Duke of Wellington from HMS Stephanus, acquired by the Quirks in England from the effects of the Countess of Cave. Monroe McKillip, also a Deerfield resident, volunteered the loan of his telescope to the display.

Several ship's models are among the items on display. Major Philip Randall is owner of a racing model sloop, and Jay Byrne is builder of a scale model of his former yacht, Grant Brown of Winnetka, Commander, USNR, shows several Navy recognition models, while another flotilla consists of Lake Michigan steamers upon which Roy Olson, as a youngster, shipped as a cabin boy. Roland Brand lent some ships-in-bottle, together with figures carved by himself of stocky, bearded clipper captains.

Every sailor has heard the order, "Smoking lamp is lit"—or out. Here veterans of modern steel ships can see a real smoking lamp belonging to Mr. Brand, which lighted pipes for the old-time tars of wooden craft.

After the show was assembled, E. H. Oppenheimer offered his prized sextant, an instrument revered by seamen who feel that its use each twilight touches man with the majesty of the cosmos; generations of navigators have used these instruments to locate themselves within a mile upon the sea's surface, using light from Vega, Altair, Spica or Polaris many trillion miles away.

Coinciding with the Highland Park yacht club's Memorial Day opening regatta, this and other items of the exhibit at the library suggest the magic of wind, stars and water which lure men and women to the sea.
