## North Shore Railway Officials Eager To Resume Operations

CHICAGO—The management  
of the Chicago North Shore &  
Milwaukee Railway is willing and  
eager to resume operations at the  
earliest possible moment, accord-  
ing to a statement issued today  
by Bernard J. Fallon, president  
of the company.

Fallon stated that the manage-  
ment understands and sympathizes  
with the vital need of many com-  
munities served by the railroad  
for an early settlement of out-  
standing difficulties and resump-  
tion of service. "Conditional on  
the Illinois Commerce Commis-  
sion's approval of a request for  
increased fares," Fallon said, "the  
company stands ready to resume  
operations on both the Skokie  
Valley and Shore Line, granting  
an immediate increase of 15 1/2  
cents an hour to all employees,  
effective upon resumption of ser-  
vice, in the case of the Shore

road can, with increased fares, be  
operated on a good business basis.

Blueprints for the second floor  
provide for rest room, locker room  
and dining quarters and a tele-  
phone operating room, which runs  
the full length of the building.  
Long distance switchboards and  
boards for handling information,  
assistance and special calls will be  
installed in the operating room.

The rest room lounge and dining  
room for women employees will  
be tastefully decorated with mod-  
ern appointments, Knox said.

Equipment for ringing Highland  
Park telephones, a vault where  
cables enter the building, batteries  
and battery charging equipment,  
emergency power and ventilating  
equipment, and the heating plant  
will be installed in the basement.  
The frame of the building and  
floors will be of reinforced con-  
crete.

"Total cost of the project, in-  
cluding building, initial dial equip-  
ment installation, outside cable  
and necessary dial conversion ex-  
penditures will be approximately  
\$3,300,000," Knox said. "Comple-  
tion date of the whole project de-  
pends on the availability of tele-  
phone equipment. The company  
expects to have the building itself  
completed within a year.

Contractor for the building pro-  
ject is Dahl-Stedman Company of  
Chicago. Holabird and Root and  
Burgue and Associates of Chicago  
is the architect.
