The family is the determinant for maximal personal satisfaction; is the basis for physical and mental health, and ultimately for social progress, democracy and enduring peace. It is impossible to educate for maturity. This is developed through relationships, and thus has meaning for social workers who can accept people and help bring out their strengths to face and meet their problems.
