### ANOTHER MOVE TOWARDS SHORELINE BUSES

The North Shore Line apparently gained another step in its determined fight to substitute busses for electric trains on the shore line route, with the report that the ICC has approved drastic increases in its rates on that section of the road.

The reported raises are so drastic (a 54-ride ticket from Lake Forest to Chicago for \$24.10, as compared to \$13.05 on the Northwestern) that it is almost certain that hardly enough tickets will be sold to pay for the

printing of them. It would appear that this is exactly what the management of the North Shore Line wants. The management seeks to have the shore line route operated on a trial basis, with the ICC supervising the operation. If the op-low' who isn't so careful. erations are "unsuccessful" the management will seek permission to abandon the line.

## Distinguished Conductor Appears For First Time

A distinguished conductor of both symphony and opera, will take over the baton as guest conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra during the second and third weeks of the 13th Ravinia Festival season.

He is Fritz Busch, who has been called one of the most distinguished of living German opera and concert conductors. He was born in Siegen, Westphalia on March 13, 1890. At the age of 19 he received his first regular appointment as conductor and chorus director of the Stadttheater in Riga. In 1922 he was named general musical director of the Dresden State Opera which became, under his guidance, one of the great opera houses of the world.

Although he had been awarded a life contract, Busch terminated his connection with the Dresden Opera in 1933 because of his opposition to Nazism. Shortly thereafter he became musical director of the Statsradiofonie in Copenhagen and conductor of the Stockholm Glyndebourne summer oper-

atic festival in England. During his years of exile from Germany he also conducted opera and concerts in many South Amat the Metropolitan Opera company with "Lohengrin" on the opening night of the 1945-46 sea-

Appearing at Ravinia for the first time, Fritz Busch will present three Ravinia "firsts" during his first week on the podium at the North Shore park.

The three "firsts" are Verdi's "Overture to 'Luisa Miller'"; Dvorak's "Symphonic Variations,

The week's series of four concerts begins on Tuesday evening, July 6, at 8:30 o'clock when Busch presents an all Brahms' Program. He will conduct the orchestra in "Academic Festival Overture, Opus 80" and Variations for Orchestra on a Theme by Joseph Hayden, Opus 56A." Following the intermission, the orchestra will play "Symphony No. 1, C. Minor, Opus 68."

Verdi's "Overture to 'Luisa Miller' " will be heard Thursday evening, July 8, and will be followed by Dvorak's "Symphonic Variations, Opus 78." The Schumann "Symphony No. 4, D Minor, Opus 120" will be played in the second half of the program.

The Saturday night, July 10, concert is devoted to "Classics of Vienna." The first selection is "Symphony No. 92, G Major, 'Oxford" by Hayden, followed by Schubert's "Dance Suite" The Mozart "Symphony, C Major (Kochel 425) and the Strauss "Waltz 'Tales from the Vienna Woods' Opus 325" will conclude the program.

On Sunday afternoon, July 11, beginning at 4:00 o'clock the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Busch will play Berlioz' "Overture to 'Benvenuto Cellini'", Debussy's "Two Nocturnes," Bizet's "Suite No. 1 'L-'Arlesienne'" and Beethoven's "Symphony No. 2, D Major, Opus
