How Can I???

Q. How can I tighten a nail, that is loose in a plastered wall?
A. Saturate a small piece of wadding with glue; wrap as much as possible around the nail and reinsert in hole, pressing in firmly. Remove excess glue with wet cloth. When dry, the nail will be rigid. Any loose chunk of plaster can be fastened in place with the glue.

Q. How can I get more cream out of milk?
A. Heat the milk until lukewarm; then chill it, and it will bring more cream to the surface.

Q. How can I stop a small leak in a pan or bucket?
A. Turn the receptacle upside down, over the leak, with a little powdered sulphur, heat an old knife blade until it is very hot and spread the sulphur around the leak.

Q. How can I clean varnished wall paper?
A. Melt a bar of yellow soap and pour into a pan of warm water. Apply with a soft whitewash brush. Do not have the brush too wet.

Q. How can I remove odors from leather shoes?
A. By cutting a raw potato into slices, placing the slices in waxed paper, and laying the waxed paper on the inside of the shoe. Wrap the shoes in heavy paper in order to keep them airtight.

Q. How can I remedy cream that seems too thick to whip properly?
A. Place the dish of cream in another dish containing cold water. When it is chilled, place it in a dish of hot water for a few minutes. It will then whip readily.

Q. How can I easily clean sponges?
A. Soak them in milk for three or four hours, wring them until perfectly dry, then rinse thoroughly in hot water.

Q. How can I remove scratches from furniture?
A. Unless too deep, they can be removed by rubbing sweet oil into the scratches with a fingertip, then polishing with a soft cloth.

Chicago Opens Mammoth Railroad Fair

CHICAGO—At 10 a.m. last Tuesday, an official flag raising ceremony in the middle of the national Railroad Fair grounds between 20th and 30th streets along the lake-front, signaled the official opening of the mammoth rail-roading centennial.

Expected to draw at least 2,000,000 visitors, the Railroad Fair with its 50 acres of spectacular outdoor pageantry, dramatized exhibits and grand-scale entertainment, will be open to the public daily through the entire summer from 10 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. daily.

The Fair is planned as a commemoration of the opening of Chicago to rail transportation just a century ago this year, the event which proved the real beginning of the final conquest of the west and led directly to the rapid rise of Chicago as the world's greatest transportation hub.

Beauty at Home

Q. What causes hair to lose its gloss?
A. Too-frequent shampoos, and the wrong type, rob the hair of beauty, especially if it tends to be dry, and too-frequent shampoos make the oily scalp more oily. Use only the purest castile liquid shampoos, and persist in that daily brushing.

Q. How should the very long type of face be made up?
A. You can shorten its appearance by placing the color spot slightly below the cheekbones and adding a touch of rouge to the remainder of the face. Avoid using too much rouge.

Q. What can I do about large pores on my face?
A. They will shrink if you clean your skin often. Large-pored skin usually accompanies oiliness, so use soap and water. Next, apply skin lotion and finish with an astringent. For party times, camouflage these skin openings with heavy makeup base of skip paste.

Q. How can I make my eyes seem larger?
A. By applying eye shadow close to the eyelashes and blending it upward toward the eyebrows and outward toward the temples.

Q. What can I do to clean my knees and heels thoroughly?
A. Add a little powdered pumice to a soap lather, and scrub these places with a brush. Rinse, and massage with hand lotion.

Q. When a sudden "bump" or pimple appears, what can be done about camouflaging it?
A. First blend some powder and foundation cream into a paste and pat this skillfully on the blemish. Then press some powder over the spot gently, and the blemish is hidden.

Q. What are some dressing hints for concealing some of the more common physical faults?
A. Wide hips need bias seams, stripes or vertical panels to reduce their apparent size. A short, thick neck will appear longer if the neckline is oval or a "V", while the long, thin neck may be concealed in part by a high collar or a draped neckline.

Q. What are some colors that will flatter black hair?
A. Deep yellow, dark red, gold, and jade green all do something for the person with black hair.
