

2-Year-Old Child Meets Accidental Death By Drowning

One of life's tragedies occurred Saturday forenoon when 2 1/2 year-old Jane Ederheimer, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Guy L. Ederheimer, 115 Clifton avenue, met death by drowning in a miniature fish pond in the back yard of the R. J. Ryan residence next door.

It is supposed that the child, who had been playing in her own back yard, wandered to the adjoining yard, and, while watching the goldfish in the pool, lost her balance. The pond, at its deepest point, is 18 inches.

The child was discovered by another neighbor shortly before noon, while she was looking for her own three-year-old daughter. Drs. Crossman, Zeisler, Solomon and Weinfeld, together with a fire department inhalator squad, worked over an hour to restore the child to consciousness, without success.

Besides her parents, the child is survived by her grandparents, the Guy Ederheimers Sr. and Mr. and Mrs. J. Stevens, all of Chicago.

How Can I?? By Anne Ashby

Q. How can I mend broken glass?

A. Purchase about ten cents worth of water glass from any drug store, and paint the broken edges of the glass, using a small, soft brush. The mended portion will not show.

Q. How can I remove yellow spots from white enamel?

A. By rubbing with a flannel cloth that has been dipped into garden mold.

Q. How can I prevent starch from blowing out of drying clothes?

A. Add a little salt to the starch and it will prevent the starch from being blown out of the clothes while they are drying on a windy day.

Q. How can I repair a broken place in the plastered wall?

A. By applying a thick paste made of two parts of sand, two parts of sifted coal ashes, and one part of white flour, adding enough water to get the proper consistency.

Q. How can I make a substitute for a pastry board?

A. Try using a piece of clean white oilcloth. It is more easily cleaned than a board, and can be rolled up and put away in a clean place for the next time wanted.

Q. How can I keep egg yolks if they are not needed for immediate use?

A. Place them in cold water and keep in a dark, cool place, and they can be kept fresh for several days.

Q. How can I clean the soiled leaves of house plants?

A. By applying equal parts of milk and warm water. Use a sponge, and rub gently to prevent breaking the leaves.

Q. How can I remove the shine from black clothing?

A. By rubbing well with a piece of flannel that has been dipped into spirits of turpentine; dry in the open air.

District 108 Proceeds With Building Plans

The Board of Education of District 108 has been proceeding with the steps to carry out the building program for school District 108. The first step in this program was the sale of bonds authorized by the election in June by the voters. This bond issue, totaling \$1,750,000.00, was sold to a group, including the First National Bank of Chicago, the Harris Trust Company, and the Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co. The average rate of this low bid was 2.16795%, with a premium on the entire issue of \$385. This bid was accepted by the Board of Education after reviewing other bids submitted to the board of Education.

Bids to be Accepted For West Ridge School

Working drawing for the addition to West Ridge School have been completed and plans and specifications are now available to contractors and sub-contractors interested in bidding on the West Ridge addition. Plans and specifications are available in the offices of Bertram Weber, Architect, Chicago, Illinois. The plan contemplates the receiving of bids in early August and the awarding of the bids at that time. It is contemplated that construction will be underway late this summer and fall. The West Ridge addition includes the construction of four new classrooms, offices and the remodeling of the present building.

Moderization of Other Schools Underway

The Board of Education has also begun work on the modernization of Lincoln, Ravinia, and Braeside Schools. Contracts have been let for weather-stripping of Lincoln and Ravinia Schools, acoustic installations at Lincoln, reroofing work at Braeside, construction of new outside entrance for Ravinia auditorium, and the installation of a fire door in the under-stage area at Ravinia, and the fire-proofing of the upper stage area at Ravinia. Plans are also underway for obtaining bids for general relighting to be completed at the earliest possible moment at the Lincoln, Ravinia and Braeside Schools.

It is hoped that much of this relighting can be done before fall opening. Also, bids are being received for temperature control systems at Braeside, West Ridge, Lincoln, and Ravinia.

Certain other modernization work contemplated under the complete program has been scheduled for next summer. This part of the modernization program includes construction of fire-proof stairs, certain general other remodeling work, redecoration in all of the schools, and re-equipment in terms of school furniture.

Working Drawings on the New Intermediate School Underway

The Board of Education has authorized the architect to proceed with preparation of working drawings based upon the accepted preliminary sketches for the Intermediate School. It is expected that drawings will be completed sometime in February, 1949, so that bids for the new structure can be taken early in 1949.

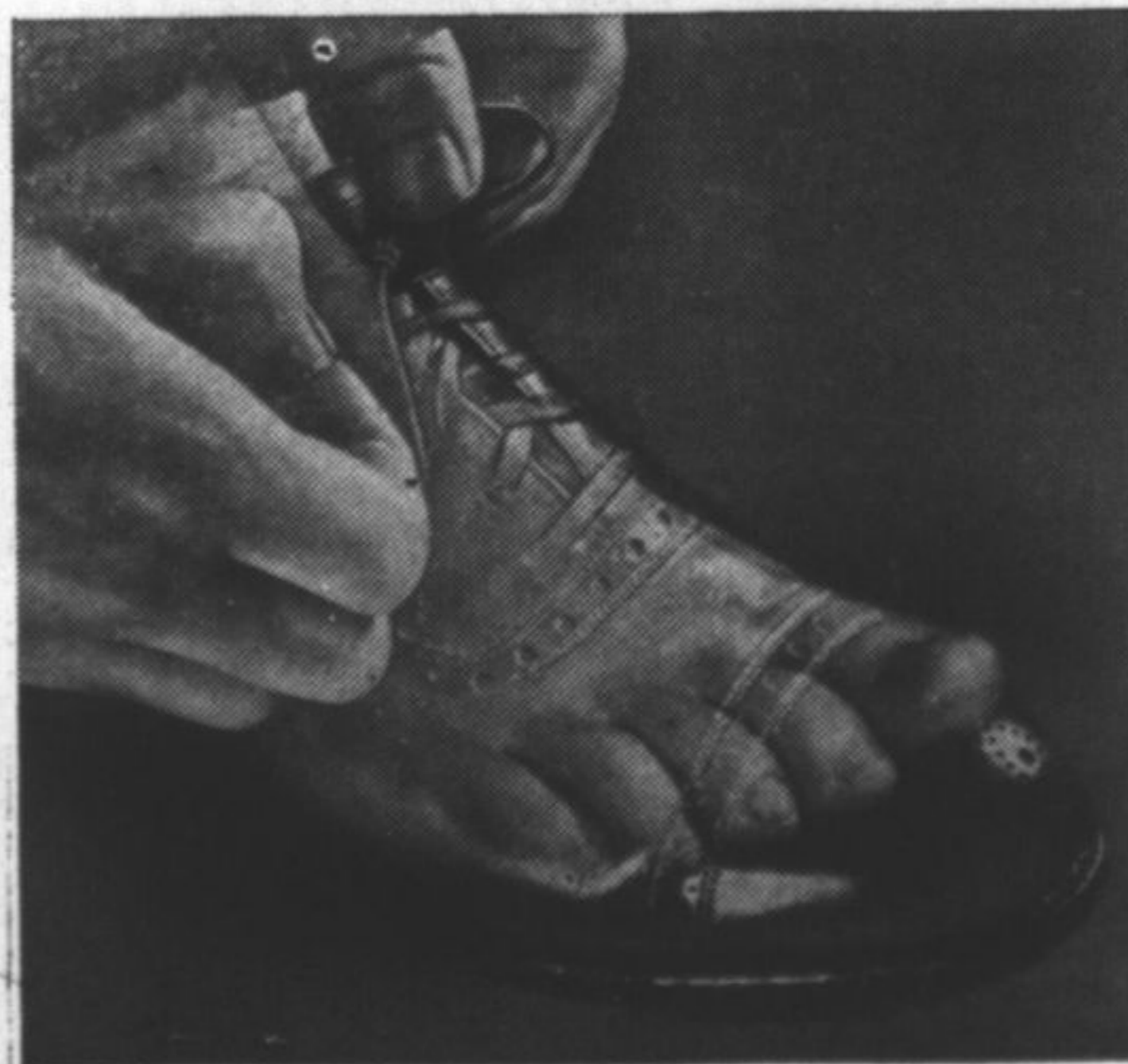

MEAT DEALERS ARE HEROES OF FAT SALVAGE OPERATION

"To the 200,000 meat dealers in this country goes a great share of the credit for keeping current fat salvage collections virtually on a par with war years, and the years during which ration points were paid for used cooking fat," the American Fat Salvage Committee points out.

Housewives have received both a cash and point bonus for their kitchen salvage. Renderers are in the business of picking up used cooking fat and processing it. But the meat dealer who links the homemaker and renderer, gets little reward—either monetary or honorary—for his efforts.

Meat dealers have taken in over their counters more than 700 million pounds of used cooking fat, paid homemakers in ration points and cash, and also have taken it upon themselves to remind customers to save used fats and bring them into the store.

"The effectiveness of this personal touch can never be over-rated," the American Fat Salvage Committee explains. "It is probably the biggest single factor today in keeping homemakers on the job of saving fat."

"Reports from our field staff, Department of Agriculture County Agents and chain store executives clearly show that meat dealers have taken over the responsibility of keeping homemakers pepped up about fat salvage."

"American meat dealers have handled 717,175,767 pounds of used cooking fat in the last five years and 10 months and are truly the unsung heroes of the whole fat salvage operation," the statement concludes.
