Returned From Pacific

Remains of 3,961 Americans who lost their lives during World War II are being returned to the United States from the Pacific area aboard the United States Army Transport Dalton Victory, the Department of the Army announced today. Arrival of the vessel will be announced by the San Francisco Port of Embarkation.

Armed forces dead originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in the Philippine Islands are among those being brought back to this country.

A total of 257 remains are being returned upon instructions of next of kin residing in Illinois.




