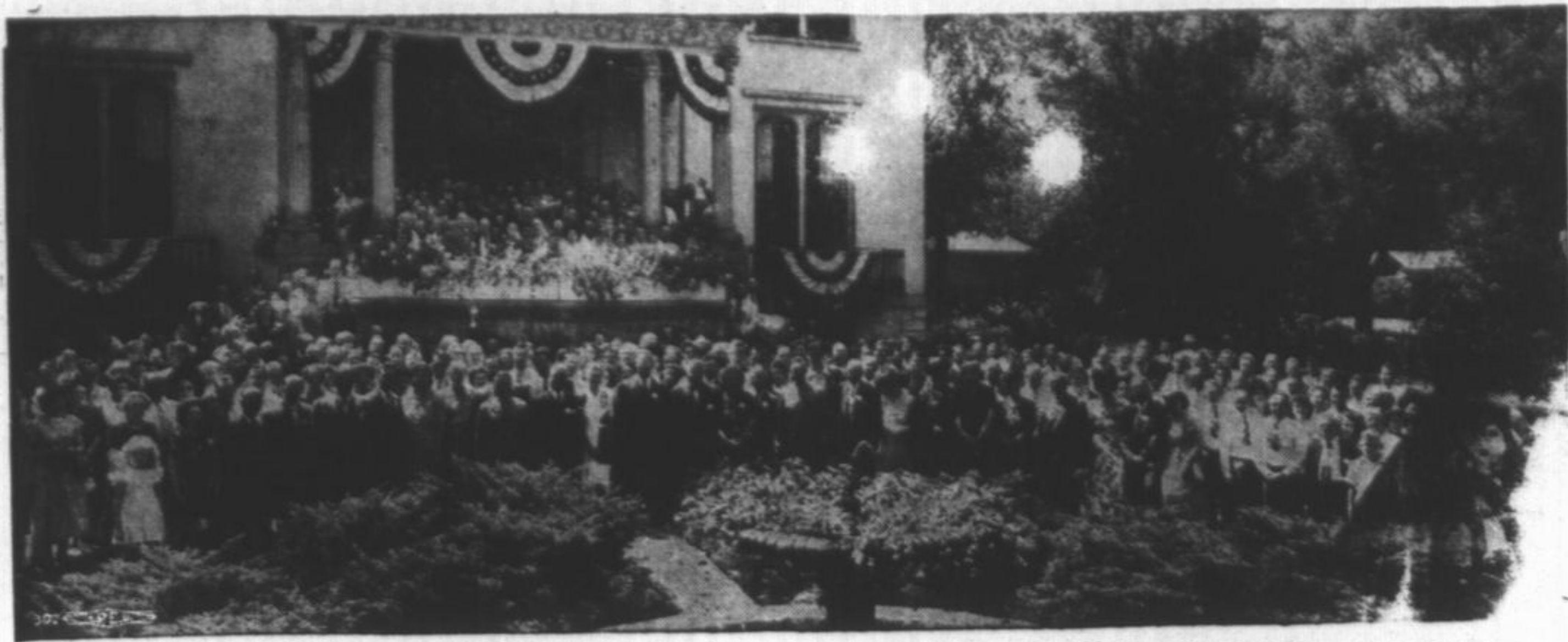


ILLINOIS EDITORS GUESTS OF GOVERNOR GREEN AT STATE FAIR
