**N. S. Art League Instruction in Ceremonies And Painting Starts Sept. 21**

The North Shore Art League is starting a new class on Tuesday afternoons in their studio in the Com. House in Winnetka. The class will be a two-fold one: ceramics and painting. A 15 week term starts Tuesday, September 21.

Myra Lynn (Mrs. Don Yacoe) will be the instructor of ceramics. She studied at the University of Indiana, the University of Chicago, and graduated from the Chicago Art Institute with a B.F.A.

She has taught classes at the Community Center of Beverly Hills, Illinois and for the past year has taught at Katharine Lord's Studio in Evanston. For the past three years she has exhibited in the Chicago and Vicinity Show at the Art Institute, at the Evanston Art Center and last May had a one man show at the Gallery Studio in Chicago. She won the prize for sculpture at the Evanston and North Shore Artists Exhibition at the Evanston Women's Club in March.

Her work can be currently seen at the Associated American Artists Galleries in Chicago. Don Yacoe will teach a painting class the same afternoons combining landscape, still life and painting from the model, instructing in all painting mediums. Students will have the opportunity of dividing their time if they wish, taking half the 15 lessons in ceramics with Mrs. Yacoe and half in painting with Mr. Yacoe.

Mr. Yacoe was staff artist of the U. S. 8th Army in New Guinea, the Philippines and Japan painting murals; also painting series of water colors for Life Magazine.

He has exhibited at the Art Institute of Chicago, Associated American Galleries (where work can currently be seen) Old West Territory Art Exhibit at Springfield, where he won the lithograph prize in 1947, Pennsylvania Academy of fine arts Water Color show; Purchase prize, Corpus Christi Museum, Texas 1947; National Academy of Design, Audubon Artists; Brooklyn Museum; Seattle Art Museum; Rochester Memorial Art Museum; University of Indiana; North Shore Art League; Joslyn Museum, Omaha, Nebraska; Marshall Fields Gallery. The Babcock Gallery in New York had a one man show of his in 1946.

He was educated at the University of Chicago, graduated from the Art Institute of Chicago with a B.F.A. and was awarded the John Quincy Adams Foreign Traveling Fellowship.

Election day is rapidly approaching and you will not be allowed to vote at the November 2nd election unless you are a registered voter.  
If you are not registered but you will have resided in the state one year, in the county ninety days, in the precinct thirty days, and will be not less than twenty-one years of age by November 2nd., you should registered at once.  
If you are registered as a voter and your residence has continuously been the same as when you registered, you will be qualified to vote at the November 2nd election.  
**BUT REMEMBER**  
If you are registered and have moved to a different residence, you must request a transfer of your registration to your new residence address.  
If you are registered but have changed your name by marriage or otherwise, you must cancel the registration under the previous name, \*\* and you must reregister anew. \*\*  
Be sure that you will be qualified to vote, do it now, do not wait and then find out that you are too late.
