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As an example, between the hours of about 9 and 11 on dark mornings when many customers are using extra lighting and industrial plants are at their maximum operations, the total use of electricity frequently reaches a point where requirements for service strain all of our present resources. This shortage of generating capacity, now existing in most areas, has become a national problem.

In normal prewar years, this did not occur because we were able to provide more and more plant capacity in advance of increased requirements for service. The normal excess of plant capacity over peak use always left a comfortable margin, permitting units to be taken out of service for overhauling, and providing reserve in case of mechanical failure. Even during the war, although we were not permitted to add new capacity, we were able to meet exceedingly high demands for war production, as a result of our policy of providing capacity in advance of requirements.

As soon as wartime limitations were relaxed, additional equipment was ordered, but because of the wartime delays and the increased length of time required to obtain new equipment, it has not been possible for us to match the unprecedented and continuing growth of the use of electricity with the installation of corresponding amounts of additional generating capacity.

This information is given you in line with our policy of keeping the public informed of conditions affecting electric service in the area we serve.

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
