District 108 Enrollment Increases

Wible, and Robert C. Wilson. This phase of the campaign will be completed before general house-to-house solicitation begins. All Highland Parkers will be urged to increase their contributions by at least 5 per cent over their 1947 donations in order to meet this year's budget. By applying stringent economy measures to all budgets for beneficiary agencies and by elimination of any costly publicity and booklets this year, it will be possible to meet 1948 needs with an increase of 5 per cent, far less than the general rise in operating costs.

"It is important for new residents to know, and for all of us to realize, that Highland Park does not receive any funds from contributions made in Chicago or in any other community," states President Keare. "Our quota will have to be raised entirely by local contributions to our Highland Park Chest. Therefore, if business reasons made it necessary for Highland Parkers to contribute anywhere else, we hope they will remember to set aside a sum (and we hope it's larger!) for the Community Chest in their own home towns. Only in this way can we enable our own local agencies to continue their needed work."

Local Agencies to Benefit
The directors of the Highland Park Community Chest have officially designated that funds will be allocated to the following 12 health, welfare and recreational agencies which have local significance or are of interest to a large number of Highland Park citizens: The Arden Shore Association; the North Shore Area Council, Boy Scouts of America; the Highland Park Girl Scouts; the Highland Park Hospital Foundation; the Family Service of Highland Park; the Women's Auxiliary of the Highland Park Hospital; the Infant Welfare Society, Highland Park-Ravinia Center; the Northwestern University Settlement; the Ridge Farm Preventorium; the Salvation Army (Lake County Branch); the Young Women's Christian Association; and the Catholic Charities (Lake County Division). In each case, requirements for funds were carefully scrutinized by the Budget Committee before allocations were made.

CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION
On Tuesday, September 22nd at 2:00 P. M. in the Council Chamber, City Hall, the Civil Service Commission of the City of Highland Park will hold an examination to establish an eligible list for Stenographer for the City Clerk.
