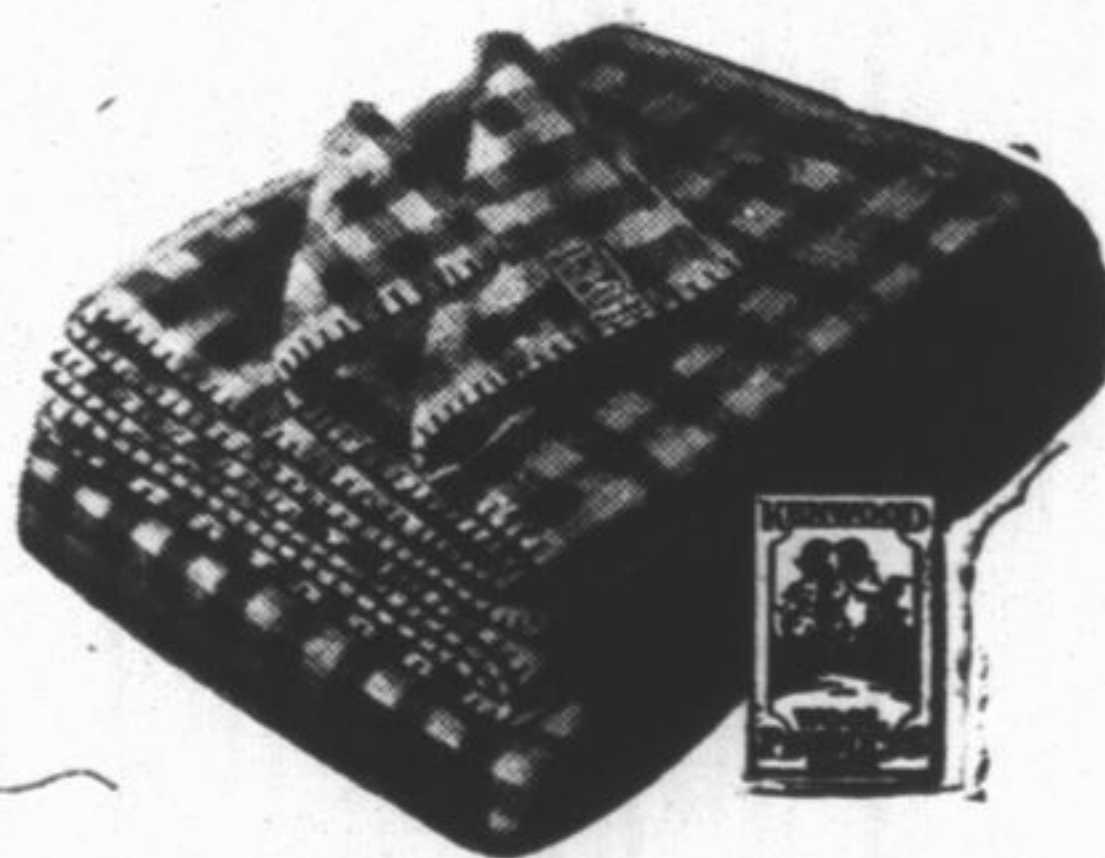

Izaak Walton League Sponsors State-Wide Essay Contest

A contest open to high school students and 7th and 8th grade pupils in all public, parochial and private schools throughout Illinois is being sponsored by the Illinois Division of the Izaak Walton League of America, was announced this week by Robert C. O'Hair, state president of the league.

Prizes will total \$300. State-wide first place winners in both high school and 7th and 8th grade divisions will each receive \$50 for the best essay on "Why

Illinois Streams Should Be Rid Of Industrial And Human Wastes." Second, third and fourth place winners will receive \$25, \$15, and \$10, respectively, with twenty-five \$1 prizes for runners up in each division. A special \$50 prize will be presented for the most suitable title for a "Merit Award" certificate which the Izaak Walton League plans to present to cities, towns and industries that keep their waters free of pollution.

"Pollution of streams is becoming an increasing menace to public health," O'Hair said. "Medical authorities have cited pollution
