Telephone tips



How to reverse charges on a Long Distance call

You can easily reverse the charges on a Long Distance telephone call—provided the party you call agrees. Here's how you do it. Suppose you want to call someone in New York. Give the number to the Long Distance operator like this: "New York City, Circle 0-0390, collect." And then she'll ask your name.

Then before she connects you she will say to the other party: "I have a collect call for you from Mr. Jones at Blanktown, Illinois. Will you accept the charge?"

You may reverse the charges on person-to-person calls at the same rates as those charged for regular person-to-person calls. On certain collect station-to-station calls, of less than 35c, it costs a little more to reverse the charges.

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
