**League Of Women Voters**

As the major party candidates for national office square off for the election it is fitting to call attention to the important place occupied in public affairs by the League of Women Voters. Founded in 1920 by Carrie Chapman Catt on the basis of the Woman Suffrage Amendment, the organization steadily has broadened its scope to provide a unique non-partisan service for all citizens.

In more than 600 communities throughout the country, some 83,000 volunteer workers of the League are devoting tireless energy to promoting "political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government." In the League's agenda that aim is more than a phrase. It means a constant hammering to promote every method of such participation. It means urging voters to enroll in the parties of their choice. It means constantly trying to overcome indifference to the primary by getting out a big primary vote. It means inducing public-minded citizens to serve as party workers and run for office.

Through the frequent issuance of pamphlets, the League keeps its members up to date on such matters as credit, the nation's position in world trade, and the United Nations and Palestine. Keeping its sights high, the League carries prominently on its current agenda for 1948-50 a concentration on the strengthening of the United Nations. Unceasingly the individual is reminded that politics is, indeed, his "job," that political pressure, rightly applied, has a place in our democracy, that political machines can be beaten and that evil trends can be eliminated from public life. By keeping the individual reminded of his duties and obligations of citizenship, the League of Women Voters is doing an excellent work in helping to keep the machinery of our democracy functioning smoothly and effectively.

**Selective Service Calls For 882 Men During December, 1948**

Colonel Paul G. Armstrong, Director of Selective Service for the State of Illinois announced today that Illinois has received a call from Major General Lewis B. Hershey, Director of Selective Service, for a total of 882 men for delivery during the month of December 1948. "It will be necessary for us to examine more than 4000 registrants," said Colonel Armstrong, "to accomplish our quota." "We have been advised that the delivery of the 882 inductees must be accomplished within the first twenty days of December. No persons are going to be inducted into the armed services after December twentieth because of the holiday season."

Colonel Armstrong said it will be necessary to call 4000 men for physical examination in the month of November to meet the December quota. Plans are now being laid to step up the daily quota that will be sent to induction stations between now and December to have the necessary supply of men available.

**North Shore Congregation Israel To Hold Succoth Services**

Succoth, the Feast of Tabernacles, one of the most beautiful observed on the Jewish calendar, begins at sundown on Sunday, October 17, and continues for eight days. Services in observance of the Succoth festival will be conducted at North Shore Congregation Israel, Glencoe, by Dr. Edgar E. Siskin on Monday morning, October 18, 11 o'clock and on Monday morning, October 25, at 11 o'clock. Harvest decorations will adorn the Temple and a Succah will be erected on the Temple grounds.

On Sunday, October 24, the joint Succah celebration in which the adults and children of the Congregation join, will be held at 10:30 in the morning. This is a service at which the children entering the Religious School for the first time mount to the altar to receive the Rabbi's blessing.

The history of the Succah festival dates back to Biblical times, and is associated with the time of the Exodus in the Books of Exodus, Leviticus, and Deuteronomy. It symbolizes the wanderings of the Israelites in the wilderness. It is also an ancient agricultural harvest festival that has been given the deep spiritual meaning of Thanksgiving by religious teachers over the ages.

Late Friday night services will be resumed at North Shore Congregation Israel on Friday night, October 22, at 8:15 o'clock.
