How Can I??

Q. How can I remove printing from cloth?
A. To remove the printing from flour and sugar sacks, cover the bags with kerosene and let them stand for 24 hours; then cover with cold water, naphtha soap cut up fine, and allow to boil for 20 minutes. Then wash as usual. If necessary, repeat the operation.

Fortune In Television, Avers "Y" Instructor

"There's a fortune to be made in television, and you might as well make some of it," said Jane Ashman to her opening class in program planning and writing on Tuesday night at the Highland Park YWCA. "Within five to ten years television will be bigger than radio—bigger than the motion picture industry."

This evening course, which includes instruction in radio as well as television, will run for eight weeks, meeting each Tuesday night from 8 to 9:30. The classes are open to men as well as women. Anyone interested should phone the "Y" at Highland Park 675.

Miss Ashman is planning several interesting "field trips" in addition to the class sessions. First of these will be attendance at a party of the Radio Writers' Guild this Saturday night in Chicago. Other events include visits to the television studios of WKBK and the WENR-TV Variety Show in the Civic Theatre.

"Television offers tremendous opportunities," declares Jane Ashman. "And right now—with four stations opening in Chicago—is the time to get into it. Ten years ago—before the big radio shows moved to the east and west coasts—Chicago was as important a radio center as Hollywood and New York. Now we have a chance to make it just as important in television—if we create good original shows here."

Miss Ashman, whose radio series have won several national awards, broke into radio in Chicago in 1935 "by reading an article on 'How to Write a Radio Script'—and writing one." Three years later, in New York, she collaborated with Gilbert Selles, Director of Television Programs for CBS, on the "Americans All—Immigrants All" series which won a gold microphone from the Women's National Radio Committee as "the most original and informative show of the year."

In addition to her work in radio, Jane Ashman has had considerable experience in the theatre, having served for two years as assistant to Eddie Dowling during his production of "The Glass Menagerie." Last June she happened to be at home in Deerfield when H. M. Rogers' Tenthouse Theatre suddenly appeared.

"Frankly, I didn't believe their publicity," says Miss Ashman, "when I read in our local paper that a New York producer was going to open a summer theatre there. So I dropped around to rehearsal to see. That one look at them—costumed in blue jeans, with a barren church basement for setting—convinced me that here was something pretty terrific. But I also realized that they'd need someone to do a lot of shouting before anyone would really believe it. That's why I took over their publicity campaign."
