Oct. 24 Third Birthday Of Un. Nations Charter

"This Sunday, October 24, has been proclaimed United Nations Day. It is the 3rd anniversary of the date when the U.N. Charter was Created," Mrs. Clarence Goelzer, chairman of the League of Women Voters United Nations workshop, announced this week. "The general assembly has stated in a resolution that 'the United Nations cannot achieve the purposes for which it has been created unless the peoples of the world are fully informed of its aims and activities.' That puts a responsibility on us as individuals to learn all we can about this organization," Mrs. Goelzer pointed out.

"In the League's U.N. workshop we are studying the purposes and accomplishments of the U.N., its stumbling blocks and ways in which it can be strengthened. Later in the year there will be discussion groups for the entire League membership to which the public will be invited."

Mrs. Goelzer stated that there are many sources of study on the U.N., adding that our own public library has a shelf devoted to U.N. literature. "In a democracy the people make their foreign policy either out of ignorance or out of understanding. It is up to us to see that American foreign policy is based on understanding," Mrs. Goelzer concluded.
