This work is carried on every Wednesday morning at the hospital, and workers are very badly needed.

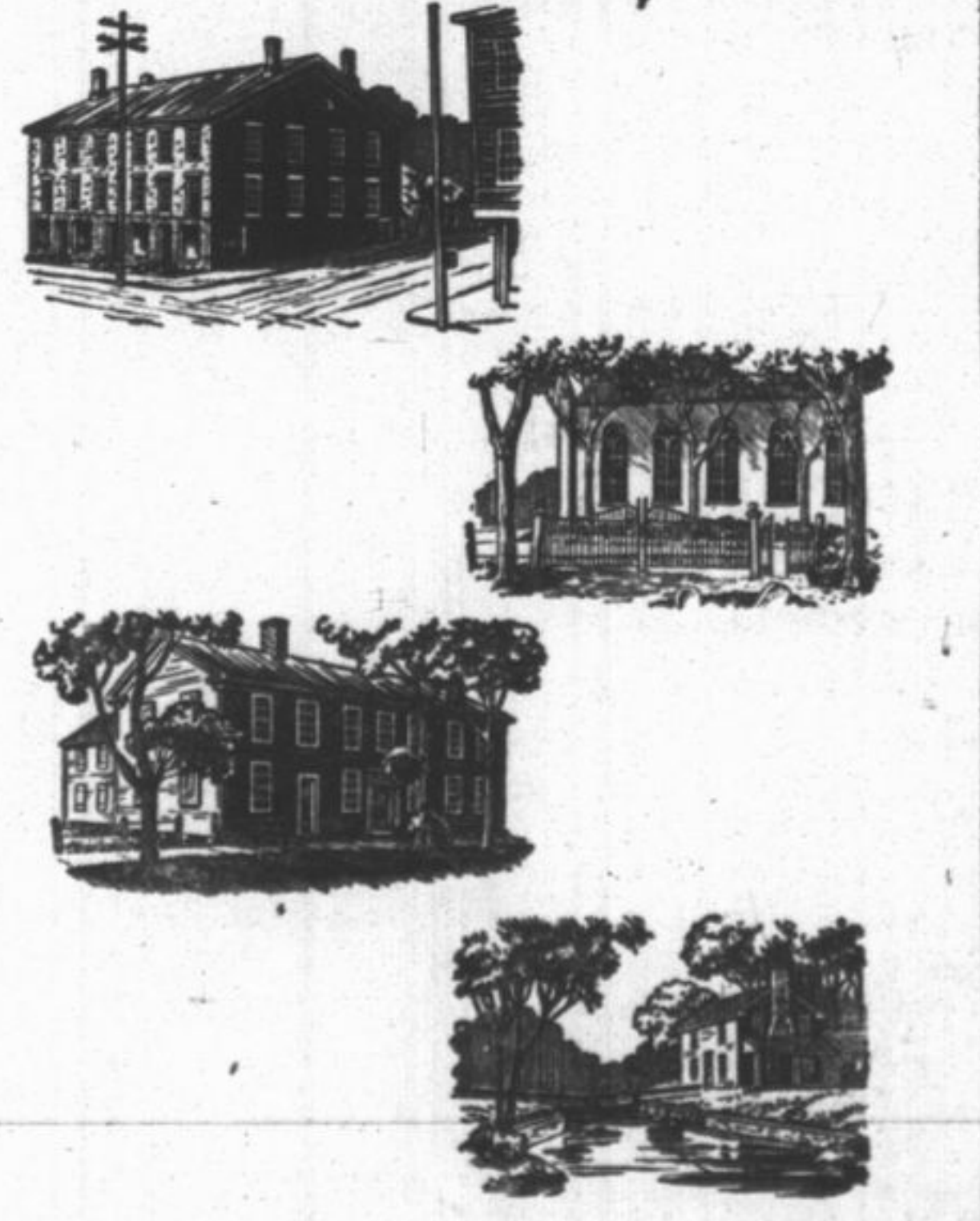
