AWARDED GOLD STARS

Lt. Commander Thomas Hamil Reidy, USNR, of 273 Central avenue, has been awarded the Gold Stars in lieu of the Eighth and Ninth Air Medals and Permanent Citations by Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan, for the President.

Text of the complete citation is as follows: "For meritorious achievement in aerial flight as Pilot of a Plane in Fighting Bombing Squadron Eighty Three, attached to the USS Essex, during operations against enemy Japanese forces in the vicinity of Kyushu and the Ryukyu Islands from May 4 to 11, 1945. Completing his twenty-fifth strike against enemy airfields, installations and defense positions, Lt. Commander (then Lt.) Reidy contributed materially to the infliction of damage on the enemy, thereby aiding the operations of our ground and surface forces in this area. His airmanship and courage throughout were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Service."

Mr. Reidy is the husband of the former Barbara Tennant. The Reids are the parents of two sons, Dustin, 4, and James, 3, and a daughter, Lynn, 1.
