AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CREATING A TRAFFIC COMMISSION AND ESTABLISHING TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, PASSED AND APPROVED MARCH 10, 1941" (AMENDING SCHEDULE VIII—STOP INTERSECTIONS THEREOF).
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That Schedule VIII attached to and made a part of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Creating a Traffic Commission and Establishing Traffic Regulations for the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, Passed and Approved March 10, 1941", and being the Schedule of said Ordinance prescribing and designating stop intersections for traffic in said City, be and it is hereby amended by adding and deleting therefrom the following:
On Lake Avenue proceeding north, stop at Prospect Avenue;
On Dale Avenue proceeding north or south, stop at Prospect Avenue;
On Linden Avenue proceeding north or south, stop at Prospect Avenue.

SECTION II. That Schedule VIII attached to and made a part of an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Creating a Traffic Commission and Establishing Traffic Regulations for the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, Passed and Approved March 10, 1941", and being the Schedule of said Ordinance designating stop intersections for traffic in said City, be and it is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:
At Prospect Avenue proceeding east or west, stop at Linden Avenue.

SECTION III. The duly constituted officers of this City be and they are hereby authorized and directed to remove at the intersections enumerated in Section I hereof all traffic signs heretofore and now installed and to install at the intersection described in Section II hereof appropriate stop sign or stop signal at such intersection.
SECTION IV. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its filing, passage, approval and publication as required by law.

The electricians, John Sickle and Peter Padorr, arrange the lighting for the unique effects necessary for the staging of the play.
