Christmas Seals
Christmas Seal purchases for the 42nd annual Seal Sale in Lake County conducted by the Lake County Tuberculosis Association amounted to \$11,904.60, according to an announcement today by Mrs. Mabel McCullough, county Seal Sale chairman.

The Sale began Nov. 22, and will continue until Christmas. Returns will be used to support the association's 1949 program of tuberculosis prevention and control.

"Returns so far represent 28.2 percent of this year's goal of \$42,000," said Mrs. McCullough. "The goal is the minimum needed for the association's operating expenses during 1949. Returns to date have been from county residents who were prompt in answering their Seal Sale letters," said Mrs. McCullough. "Although the Seal Sale continues until Dec. 25, we are doubly grateful when the returns come in early."
