Christmas Seal Sales

"Education of the public is one of the most important factors in the control of tuberculosis," Dr. Roland R. Cross, state director of public health, declared today in endorsing the sale of Christmas seals now being conducted by the Illinois Tuberculosis Association and affiliated local groups. In addition to educational programs, funds raised through the sale of Christmas seals are used to search out more cases of tuberculosis; to rehabilitate tuberculosis patients in order that they may assume their normal place in society again; and to carry on research programs to provide additional scientific information regarding this disease.

"The campaign against tuberculosis must be waged on all fronts if complete and final elimination of the disease is ever to be realized," Dr. Cross concluded.

Lincoln School Dads Sponsor Skating Rink

Everything is being put in readiness for a full season of skating at the Lincoln school rink by the Lincoln School Dads' committee, which is headed by James P. Moore.

New lights and a hockey pond have been installed, a hockey rink assembled, sound equipment put in readiness, and letters have been circulated to parents and patrons of the school announcing the fact that the rink should be open on or about December 15.

After school supervision on the rink will be handled by Mr. Robert Bock, retired custodian of the Lincoln school. The evening supervision will be in the hands of the Dads' committee. Flooding and maintenance is under the direction of Mr. Ed Brown, superintendent of the Park board.

The rink is supported from contributions by the parents and citizens of the community. In order to make the skating facilities pleasant and safe, a new oil heater has been installed in the skating shack, safety signs will be posted, new records and sound equipment have been put in readiness, a telephone has been installed, and the interior of the shack painted by the Dads' committee.

In order to make it a cooperative enterprise between the children and the parents of the Lincoln School, the Bulletin Board committee of the Lincoln School

student council is circularizing the school's skating rules among the student body. A list of the rules is as follows: 1. All skaters must wear skating buttons. 2. Skaters must enter by "In" (North door) and leave by "Out" (East door). 3. Skating against traffic strictly forbidden. 4. Hockey pond to be used for hockey players only. 5. Children must leave pond promptly and go directly home when lights go out. 6. Children not allowed inside supervisor's cage. 7. Telephone to be used for calls to parents or homes only. 8. No playing in warming house.

In addition to Mr. Moore, the Dad's committee is comprised of: Dr. Walter Reich, Mr. M. A. Tighe, Mr. Martin Granholm, Mr. LeRoy Leonard, and Mr. Stanley McKee, principal of Lincoln school, who serves as an ex officio member of the committee.

Highland Park Swimmers Defeat Maine 46-29 For Second Victory

Taking first in every event aside from the 200-yd. crawl and 200-yd. crawl relay, the Little Giant swimming squad swamped Maine 46-29 last Friday at the Maine township pool.

It was the second victory in as many starts for Mr. Kendig's boys. Under the new meet rules, Friday's encounter started off with the 50-yd. freestyle instead of the 160-yd. relay. Keen Block was the winner in this event, with Dick Heiler swimming a close second.

The next race found Roger Morrison winning the 100-yd. breast stroke in the respectable time of 1:11.9—in a 50-yd. pool. After Russ Clark garnered a 2nd place in the 200-yd. freestyle, Gerson Widoff added more points to Highland Park's lead by winning the 100-yd. crawl.

In the 100-yd. backstroke, Dave McCulloch splashed out his second consecutive victory.

When the judges added up the points for the respective diving performances, another Highland Parker, Ken Hirsch, was given first place.

The festivities ended with the swimming of the two relays. The Giant team of McCulloch, Morrison, and Heiler was victorious in the medley, while Maine brought themselves a bit of consolation by winning the 200-yd. four man crawl event.

Final score: Highland Park 41—Maine 28.

Dave McCulloch, Roger Morrison, and Keen Block still remain undefeated in their respective events thus far in the 1948 season.
